Members of Prince's Party Lose Jewels In \$250,000 Theft

LEOPOLD AND LOEB GET LIFE TERMS

GEMS OF LORD AND LADY MOUNTBATTEN AMONG THE SPOILS

Home of Wealthy New York Oil Man Robbed Monday.

SEARCH FRUITLESS Announcement of Loss is Made by Head of Investigating Company.

New York, Sept. 10.—Jewelry valued at \$250,000 was stolen from the home of J. S. Cosden, wealthy oil man, and race horse owner, at Sand Point, Long Island, on Monday night, it was announced today by Gerard Luisi, head of the investigating company, which is in charge of the search for the robbers.

Some of the gems belonged to Lord and Lady Mountbatten, who accompanied the Prince of Wales to this country, and who were guests at the Cosden home. Although a report of the occurrence was made by members of the Cosden household soon after the loss of the jewels was discovered, no clue has been found so far which might connect anybody with the theft.

Cousins of King. The loss has caused somewhat of a sensation among society folk in the vicinity of the Cosden home as well as in other parts of the state. The fact that Lord and Lady Mountbatten are cousins to King George V., makes the event all the more interesting.

FRANCE ALARMED OVER FLOUR PRICE

Reports Say Wheat Crop Deficit Double of Previous Estimate.

By WEBB MILLER. (United Press Staff Correspondent.) Paris, Sept. 10.—Government and commercial circles are alarmed by reports indicating that the deficit in France's wheat crop is about double what had been previously predicted.

The price of flour is steadily rising and the effect upon the cost of living has been immediate. Flour rose two francs a quintal (a hundred weight) Monday, a rise of four francs within a week.

A cabinet meeting was called today to discuss measures to halt the upward trend of the cost of living. Continuous August rains throughout France and the colonies did serious damage to the crop and it now will be necessary for France to import 20,000,000 quintals instead of 10,000,000 as planned.

Le Temps points out that this will affect the exchange greatly, because it will be necessary to purchase at least one billion francs worth of foreign exchange. This usually well-informed newspaper says that crops throughout the entire world are mediocre and that if the South American crop is short it will mean a world shortage of wheat.

England, Germany, Italy and Belgium and Holland already have hurried into the markets to purchase huge quantities of grain within the past few weeks. French importers have been hesitating and as a result mills here are running with little reserve.

"The situation is sufficiently grave to demand extreme vigilance on the part of the Government and quick decision. It is urgent that the customs taxes on wheat importations be suppressed," Le Temps said.

Two Killed Trying To Beat Express

Hyannis, Sept. 10.—The lives of a husband and wife were crushed out as they raced for the Cape Cod Express when they failed to heed the warning of the station master and tried to race their automobile in front of an express train from Provincetown.

Mrs. Hilda C. Borg, of Eastonville, who was piloting the machine, was instantly killed. Her husband, Andrew C. Borg, was seriously injured and died several hours later at the Cape Cod Hospital here. Both were 45 years old.

TRYING TO THROW OFF SOVIET YOKE

Struggle of Insurgents in Georgian Republic Continues Unabated.

Constantinople, Sept. 10.—The struggle between the insurgents and the Soviet forces in the Georgian republic is continuing fiercely, according to the latest reports reaching here. The insurgents hold the principal Trans-Caucasian railway which runs through the Tiflis to Baku. Martial law has been proclaimed throughout the Caucasus and Soviet troops are being buried to Georgia.

Georgia was a part of the old Russian Empire, but refused to recognize the Bolsheviks when the latter overthrew Kerensky. The Georgians formed a separate state, proclaiming their independence in May, 1919, and receiving de jure recognition from the Allies in January, 1921. Later in 1921 a revolution occurred and a Soviet Government was set up. The Georgian insurgents are demanding recognition of their independence from the Soviet regime.

Their president, who is now in Paris, has asked the intervention of the League of Nations to stop the bloodshed and offered to submit the independence issue to arbitration.

MOVE TO ASSURE FAIR COMPETITION

League Council Approves Report of Its Economic Committee.

Geneva, Sept. 10.—The governments of 18 countries have decided that it is more important to have their foreign ministers in Geneva following the discussions on obligatory arbitration, security and disarmament, than to have them stay at home and conduct the general routine of foreign affairs.

These 18 ministers are sitting modestly side by side engaged in the hardest kind of committee work in stifling committee rooms, trying to "lend a helping hand" in the effort to put peace in Europe on a solid foundation. There is no excessive personal dignity in Geneva these days, for almost everybody here for the league sessions is either great or near great. In addition to the foreign ministers there are nine members who hold other portfolios for the governments of various countries and some 30 or 40 statesmen who have been premiers or foreign ministers during their careers.

The council of the League yesterday approved the report of its economic committee, which made proposals to serve as the basis of a conference for revision of the industrial property convention of which the object is the suppression of unfair commercial competition. It also decided to continue the study of the South American proposals regarding guarantees for foreign buyers against worthless goods.

RAIN OVER, CHINESE BELLIGERENTS ARE INTO GRIPS AGAIN

New Offensive is Started Against Forces Attacking Shanghai.

MANY CASUALTIES Foreigners Confident No Invasion of Their Quarters is Likely.

(By Canadian Press.) Shanghai, Sept. 10.—Cessation of the deluge which halted fighting along the front and west of Shanghai was the signal for resumption of firing along the whole line this morning between the forces of rival military governors battling for possession of Shanghai.

Reports from the Lung Wha headquarters of the defending forces this morning said that additional advances were made against the invading forces in the Hing sector west of Tai Lake, 90 miles west of Shanghai. The Chekiang troops reported the capture of the village of Susan in their drive to take Hing.

A force of Chekiang troops penetrated beyond Anting today, although that town remained in possession of the Kiangsu forces, Lung Wha announcements said.

General Chang Tso-Lin, Manchurian war lord, who has been attacking Shanghai since Sunday, intends to open an attack on Shanghai tomorrow against the Wu Pei Fu Peking forces, Kiangsu Governor, which will be between Peking and Mukden, principal city of Manchuria, according to a report received at Lung Wha today from a reliable source.

The drive on Hing is part of the campaign, to take Chang Chou, the police from which the defending forces hope to attack the Kiangsu troops from the rear line on the Shanghai-Nanking railway.

A New Offensive. Peking, Sept. 10.—(Canadian Press)—General Wu Pei Fu has opened a new offensive against General Lu Yung-Hsiang, the Governor of Shanghai, who is busily engaged holding back the army of Kiangsu, which has been attacking his troops west of Shanghai.

According to advices reaching Peking, General Sun Chuan-fang, who has been holding Foochow in Fukien province for Wu, has arrived at Chekiang in the south of Chekiang with a strong force of Fukien troops. His opponent, Chekiang army, is without much hope of receiving reinforcements.

Lu Prevents Rout. Shanghai, Sept. 10.—(United Press)—The international troops have been reinforced by local volunteers and more equipped with armored cars and many machine-guns. A proclamation of martial law warns the belligerents not to enter the foreign section. Yesterday's torrential rain, five inches in five hours, halted the fighting.

During Monday's critical fighting, General Chi Hsiang Yuan appeared at the front. He is reported to have been General Hsiang's left wing, but the breach actually was a narrow one and Lu rushed up 4,000 reinforcements, preventing a rout. Meanwhile, however, his general staff kept two special trains with steam up ready to beat a hasty retreat to Shanghai if necessary.

General Lu, who has been denounced by President Tsoo Kun of the Peking Government, but has the support of Chang Tso Lin, Manchurian war lord, and Sun Yat Sen, is constantly fighting on the defensive. He is reported to have the services of Czarist Russian machine gunners and aviators.

Many Wounded. Hospitals here are overcrowded with wounded soldiers and exhausted refugees. Despite the heaviest of the fighting the Americans and other foreigners in Shanghai are confident that General Chi Hsiang Yuan will not permit their quarters to be attacked even if he captures the city. No one is greatly worried except over the possibility of leaderless and defeated troops of General Lu's army pouring pell mell into the settlement in case of a rout.

BRITAIN PREPARES FOR GENERAL VOTE

Dissolution of Parliament, However Not Likely Before Next February.

By C. F. GRANDALL (British United Press.) London, Sept. 10.—The opposition parties are preparing vigorously for a general election next November. The hustings are re-echoing the press attacks filled with political propaganda. Flanders, however, on the west coast authority that a dissolution is exceedingly unlikely until next February.

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15 ARE KILLED IN PHILIPPINO RIOTS

4 Policemen and 11 Strikers Die in Clash on Kapasi Island.

Honolulu, Sept. 10.—Four policemen and 11 Filipino strikers were killed yesterday in a fight at Kapasi, a small island in the Philippines, according to advices received here today. Deputy-Sheriff Crowell is also reported to have been severely wounded.

The fight occurred when the police attempted to rescue two Filipinos who continued to work when a strike occurred on the McBride plantation at Haseppe and had been kidnapped by the strikers as they were returning to their homes yesterday.

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CONVENTION IN 1925 WILL BE IN TWO CITIES

Canadian Clubs Accept Invitation from Fort William and Port Arthur.

IMPORTANT SESSION Vital Canadian Matters Taken Up This Morning—President's Address.

A cordial invitation from Fort William and Port Arthur to hold the 1925 convention of Canadian Clubs at the head of the Great Lakes was extended jointly by Mrs. W. W. Smith and C. W. Jarvis, representatives at the convention today. The invitation was the only one presented. It was accepted unanimously.

Inspiring messages on the upbuilding of a virile Canadian national sentiment through the work of the various Canadian Clubs throughout Canada were given by the vice-presidents of the provinces at the opening business session of the 12th annual session of the Association of Canadian Clubs in the Fythian Castle this morning. From Nova Scotia to British Columbia, the reports showed a steady progress in the growth of a better Canadian citizenship, until now 76 clubs are affiliated with a combined membership totalling 80,000. Included in this number is the one outside club, the Boston Canadian Club. The report of C. W. Bonister, secretary-treasurer, also was gratifying.

Extension Work. The luncheon at 1 o'clock was a marked success, with the several hundred present hearing an eloquent address by Dr. J. B. M. Barker, K. C., of the so-called service clubs competed in a way with Canadian Clubs, he believed the Canadian Clubs had a distinct function to perform in the life of our young nation.

His speech brought forth strong endorsement from Dr. Archibald Macdonald, Halifax. The Canadian Club, he pointed out, differs from any other organization in this respect—the allegiance of others attached to the old world were English, Irish and Scottish societies, and he could not help wishing that half the energy put into these clubs be directed to the Canadian Clubs. In the Canadian Club they possessed the rapture of the forward look. They were not looking back to their ancestors. "If I were deaf," he exclaimed, "I would abolish all clubs in Canada, but the Canadian Club."

Macdonald expressed a real problem, he said, in developing unity when it was considered that one-third of the population was French-Canadian, and too much criticism and too little sympathy. 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COOLIDGE GREET'S U. S. WORLD FLIERS

President Congratulates Aviators on Being First to Circle Earth.

Washington, Sept. 10.—A statement formally welcoming and congratulating the world fliers was issued by President Coolidge yesterday after his return to the White House from Bolling Field, where he greeted them personally upon their arrival from New York.

"It is with a renewed faith in America," the President said, "that I welcome you. A new record of achievement has been made in the last six months by you in the domain of aviation. It has been your skill, your perseverance, your courage, that has brought this great honor to our country. In what I believe is the greatest opportunity for scientific development of transportation to our country. In what I believe is the greatest opportunity for your countrymen will be sufficient so that in this field America always will be kept first."

DIES SUDDENLY

Hon. R. M. MacGregor, N. S. Government Member Drops Dead in New Glasgow.

New Glasgow, N. S., Sept. 10.—Hon. R. M. MacGregor, member of the Nova Scotia Government without portfolio, director of the Bank of Nova Scotia and of the Nova Scotia Steel and Coal Company and son of a former lieutenant-governor of Nova Scotia, dropped dead at his home here, early this morning.

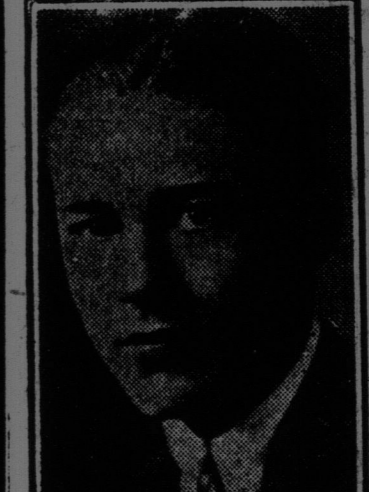
He arose at 7:30 o'clock, apparently in his usual good health, and entering his bathroom, suddenly expired. Mr. MacGregor's death at the early age of 48, is a tremendous loss to the public life of Nova Scotia. He was born in New Glasgow, son of the late Hon. James D. MacGregor.

A great grandson of Rev. Dr. James MacGregor, the pioneer missionary of Nova Scotia, who came to Pictou county from Scotland, 150 years ago, he carried on unimpaired the fine traditions of the family. He went to the New Glasgow schools and later graduated from Dalhousie University, when quite young he entered public life, making his debut in rather dramatic fashion when in a by-election about 20 years ago he defeated the late Senator A. C. Bell.

PRISONERS' YOUTH SAVES THEM FROM DEATH BY HANGING

Justice Caverly Refuses to Create Precedent in Sentencing Minors.

BOYS UNMOVED Technical Sentence of 99 Years Imposed on Kidnapping Charge.

(By United Press.) Chicago, Sept. 10.—Sentence of life imprisonment was imposed today by Chief Justice Caverly on Nathan Leopold, junior, and Richard Loeb, for their murder of Bobby Franks. The Justice also imposed a sentence of 99 years on the charge of kidnaping for ransom. The boys pleaded guilty to both offenses.

The boys, sitting on the edge of their chairs, at tense attention, received the verdict without a change of expression. It took them some 30 seconds to realize that they had escaped the noose, and they settled back in their chairs with a thin smile.

Nathan Leopold senior slumped back in his chair with tears trickling from his eyes. His mouth worked with emotion. The youthful prisoners were whisked from the room so rapidly by their guards that their brothers had no opportunity to shake their hands.

The sentence of the court is a complete victory for the defense attorneys, who had concentrated their fight on a life sentence as against death on the gallows.

Dispensing with the formality of calling the defendants before him, Justice Caverly sped from a reading of his decision to immediate sentence from the bench.

Looking directly at the boys, Justice Caverly said: "I sentence you, Nathan Leopold to the penitentiary at Joliet for the period of your natural life for the murder of Bobby Franks."

"Turning his gaze toward young Loeb, Caverly said: "I sentence you, Richard Loeb, to the penitentiary at Joliet for the period of your natural life for the murder of Bobby Franks."

"Turning back to Leopold, Justice Caverly said: "I sentence you Nathan Leopold to the penitentiary at Joliet for 99 years for the kidnaping of Bobby Franks. And then the final sentence: "I sentence you Richard Loeb, to the penitentiary at Joliet for 99 years for the kidnaping of Bobby Franks."
