**REBUILDING "FARRINGTON"**

London, Oct. 24—Farrington and

Holborn station on the Metropolitan

Railway is to be rebuilt.

With approximately 1,200 trains passing

through it daily the present platform, offices and

approaches are now regarded as insufficient, and the

whole station is to be remodelled at once.

Farrington street, as the station was called until

recently, was the original terminus of the Metropolitan

when it was opened for traffic between Bishop's

road and Farringdon street in 1863.

Now Farringdon is the centre of a

service which links up directly Liverpool street with

Aylesbury, New Cross and Hammersmith, Uxbridge

with Liverpool street and South Kensington

with Cannon street.

**ST. MARTIN'S SCHOOLS.**

Dr. Mabel Hamilton, medical

inspector of schools, and Miss Ada Foley, public

health nurse, last week visited the schools of the

St. Martin's district in an inspection trip. Today they left

for Musquash district. There are now 125 pupils in the

**SWING ON CABLES TO FIGHT FIRE**

Firemen Climb Network of Steel Guys on Manhattan

Bridge—Traffic Held Up.

New York, Oct. 24—Like sailors aloft in a dangerous storm, firemen climbed

amid the network of steel guys hundreds of feet in air to fight a fire which

erupted on a scaffolding hung from one of the central cables of the Manhattan

Bridge, near the Brooklyn tower, which rises 450 feet above the river.

Ordinary fire fighting methods were of no avail. The firemen had to swing

from one strand of steel to another and chop the scaffold free, holding an axe

in one hand and clinging with the other to a high steel beam.

A seventy-five foot aerial ladder was run up, but the stream that was thrown by it

fell short of the fire and only menaced the men who were swinging the axe.

Sparks from the burning scaffold set fire to the coal pockets of Burns

Brothers at the foot of Adams Street, but flames were quickly extinguished.

The firemen finally sent the scaffold crashing down to the roadway below, where it could be extinguished easily.

Vehicular traffic on the bridge was held up for two hours.

**CITY HAS NEW CHORAL CLUB**
