## A MULTITUDE AT CAMP MEETING

Steamers, Motor Boats and  
Cars—Baptism in River—  
Notes Along the Reach—  
Haying at Hand—Fruits  
of the Garden.

Upriver steamers had large passenger  
lists on Saturday. The steamer Oceanic  
left Indian town on Saturday. The  
Dream, which left later, after being up  
the Kennebec with a good number of  
passengers and excursionists, also had  
a full list for the Long Reach.

Between sixty and seventy people got  
off the two steamers at Public Landing,  
where a large crowd of city people were  
on the wharf to greet them. A summer  
hotel at the Landing would do a great  
business. The dancing pavilion there on  
Saturday evening had the largest crowd  
of the season, including a party of young  
ladies and gentlemen who landed from  
the yacht Villain for an evening's pleasure.

This pavilion has a pretty little  
caterpillar where ice cream, cold drinks and  
confectionery can be got and it is a  
great convenience. A masquerade will  
be held next week.

Brown's Flat was the centre of attraction  
along the river yesterday. The  
steamer Hampton brought a crowd from  
the Bellisle and the Majestic another  
from Washademoak. Many others were  
in yachts and motor boats, and one visitor  
said he could hardly believe there were  
as many motor cars in commission  
in this part of the province as were  
parked there yesterday. The horse and  
carriage of former years are no longer  
popular. The tabernacle would hold but  
a portion of the crowd of people yesterday,  
and outside services were also held.  
A large number of converts were baptised  
in the river. Great numbers of  
people took lunches and could be seen  
everywhere refreshing themselves.

The day was hot. At Public Landing  
it was eighty in the shade in the afternoon.  
A constant procession of motor  
cars went up in the early part of the  
day and down again in the late afternoon.  
A number of motor boats lay at  
the Landing wharf, and quite a number  
of bathers were also in evidence. In the  
evening bonfires blazed at points along  
the shore.

Midsummer has brought some of the  
fruits of early toil in the garden. One  
may enjoy new potatoes, beets, radishes,  
chard and lettuce fresh from the earth.  
Pears will be ready in another week, and  
beans are in blossom. One farmer plans  
to put in some hay this week.
