EXODUS OF AMERICANS.

Nearly 100,000 Have Bought Canadian
Farms This Year.

Nearly 100,000 American farmers have purchased approximately \$0,000,000 acres of land in Western Canada since the beginning of the year, according to a Winninge despatch to The Calgary Daily Herald, which goes on to say that thousands more are expected during the harvest season to inspect the famous wheat belt and purchase land on which to settle next year.

This information was given out by L. A. Walch, head of a big American company, organized some time ago to handle farm lands, who declared that one of the outstanding features of this great influx of new settlers has been the trend toward British Columbia. There has also been a large emigration from Winnipeg.

Most of the American farmers who purchased land this year will not settle on it until next spring or later, the move from their present, homes depending upon circumstances.

Reports obtained from the Dominion Immigration Department, in Winnipegs show that only about 15:000 Americans who came into Western Canada made definite declaration that they were taking up residence in the country this year.

More than \$5,500,000 in actual cash was brought into Western Canada by these settlers while their effects are valued at more than \$1,700,000, according to statistics furnished by the immigration between the reflects are valued at more than \$1,700,000, according to statistics furnished by the immigration between well-tone of the partment. During March 388 cars containing settlers' effects arrived.

Nearly 2,000 of the new comers settled in Manitoba, the remainder taking up farms in Saskatchewan, Alberta, Britzish Columbia and Western Ontario.


