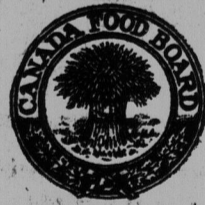

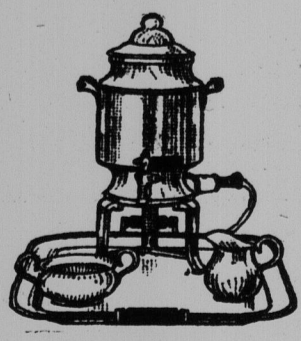

PART OF SHAMROCK GROUNDS FOR BOYS

Matter Being Looked Into With View of Providing Playgrounds

Could a portion of the old Shamrock grounds be converted into an athletic field? If so, could it be secured for that purpose?

An answer to these questions is being sought by Harold G. D. Ellis and C. W. DeForest, who, after discussing the question of playgrounds, that is now in everybody's thoughts, took a street car this morning, visited the old Shamrock grounds, and later communicated with D. Mullin, K. C., who represents the owner.

The visitors found that a portion of the grounds is in fairly good condition, but needs draining. They believe it could be drained and made into a fairly good athletic field. It is well located, has a fine record as a baseball field where famous games were played in former years, and would greatly help to meet the city-wide need of play spaces. Talking with the Times this morning Mr. Ellis said he remembers how the High School boys of his day had to rent grounds and get little or no encouragement, and now it is even worse, for there were no grounds to rent and if the boys wanted to compete with those of other towns or with Rothsay they not only must go away from home to do it, but had no ground at home on which to train. He added that he knew at least a hundred old-time and present patrons of athletic sports who would back up any movement to improve conditions for the young people in regard to well-equipped athletic field and good neighborhood playgrounds in different parts of the city.

SPEEDING THROUGH ROTHESAY BRINGS FINES

Two Automobile Drivers Fined—B. C. B. Boyd Appointed Magistrate

Speeding through Rothsay is liable to be a costly diversion for motorists in the future. The practice has been so common lately that the residents became aroused and lodged a vigorous protest. W. H. McQuade, provincial inspector under the motor vehicles act, promptly took the matter up and secured evidence which warranted him in laying information against two car owners before Magistrate Brewster in Hamilton. The cases came up yesterday afternoon and both owners were fined \$50. As these were the first cases dealt with, the fines were allowed to stand, but there is no guarantee of similar leniency in future cases.

B. C. Barclay Boyd has been appointed magistrate for the parish of Rothsay by the provincial government and in future will be in a position to deal with these cases and other infractions of the law.
