Newcastle, N. B., Aug. 21.—The convention of the Maritime Board of Trade closed today. A motion by Dr. Price was carried to the effect that the L. C. B. be asked to establish a permanent agency in Great Britain and a connection with some Atlantic steamship company to induce farm settlers to come to the maritime provinces.
A resolution favoring the government's taking over branch lines of railways in the maritime provinces and encouraging the building of branch lines, was adopted.

A 35 1/2 Mile Swim

The New London youth paddled within 800 yards of what has been the ambition of nearly every long distance swimmer, when the tide changed. He might have kept on but for the fact that the attendants in the accompanying rowboat were so weak from exposure and exertion that they had to be assisted aboard.

No other person on board the official sloop was well enough to accompany him, so he had to quit after being in the water continuously for 15 hours 21 minutes. He swam about 8 1/2 miles.
