CELEBRATIONS OF JULY TWELFTH

Moncton, N. B., July 12--The twelfth of July demonstration under the direction of the grand lodge of St. John, N. B., was highly successful. Five thousand visitors arrived in the city for the occasion and between 1,000 and 2,000 men took part in the parade. There were seven bands in line, three of them accompanying the large contingent from St. John.

At 2:30 the local and visiting lodges formed up behind Grand Master B. H. Thomas, mounted on a white horse and with bands playing, banners and flags floating in the breeze, marched along St. George street, down Weldon along Main to Steadman, then to St. George and back to the exhibition grounds where the parade was reviewed by the grand master and disbanded.

The Procession. Grand Master Thomas was supported by P. E. Heine and William Campbell, of St. John county master, as outriders. Provincial Grand Director of Ceremonies, J. W. Clarke, of this city, had charge of the procession while Cochrane and County Master C. B. Keith were also mounted. Chief of Police Rideout and Sergeant Atkins and Officer Gaw, mounted, headed the procession. The order of the procession was as follows: Mounted police, Grand Master Rev. B. H. Thomas on a white horse, William Campbell, county master; P. E. Heine, Moncton; J. W. Clarke, director of ceremonies; Amber Military Band; L. O. L. 143, L. O. L. 191, L. O. L. 41, St. John; St. John Highland Band; Carleton True Blues; L. O. L. 24, St. John; L. O. L. 3, St. John; L. O. L. 2, St. John; Summer Garden Band; bands from Westmorland and Albert counties; Sackville Band; L. O. L. 102, Sackville; Piper; L. O. L. 107, Sunny Brae; L. O. L. 8, Kelly Lodge, Moncton; L. O. L. 39, Armstrong, Moncton; L. O. L. 62, Moncton; West Scotia Chapter; L. O. L. 42, Uxham; St. John Military Band; Queens R. B. P., No. 62.

Twenty carriages and barouches followed. First carriage--Colonel Pick, Moncton, past grand master; Colonel A. J. Armstrong, St. John, past grand master; J. Morrison, St. John, grand secretary. Second carriage--N. J. N. Steeves, Moncton, past deputy grand chaplain; Andrew Rolston, St. John, past deputy preceptor of Black Knight; E. K. Bowser, Sackville and John Nisbet, Moncton. Third carriage--T. R. Campbell, Sackville, grand lodge; C. B. Ward, St. John, grand lecturer; H. Sellen, St. John, grand officer. Fourth carriage--Alex. Lutz, Thomas Smith, R. W. McKenzie, worshipful master; Sunny Brae; William Matthews, Moncton. Fifth carriage--J. C. McWilliams, Amber, county master of St. John; J. D. Perkins, Fredericton, treasurer, Royal Scotia lodge.

Seventh carriage--George A. Price, Salisbury, financial secretary; John Williamson, Newcastle, past grand master; D. McGarr, Newcastle; J. D. Kethro, Newcastle, chaplain of Empire lodge. After the parade the usual speaking-making was indulged and a feature of this proceeding was the civic welcome extended by Alderman W. K. Gross, acting mayor, in the absence of Mayor Robinson and greetings extended by the Sons of England of this city.

Grand Secretary H. G. Wadman acted as chairman, and first called on Ald. Gross, who briefly extended a cordial welcome to the visiting Orangemen. Grand Master Thomas replied at some length, referring to past their work, aims and objects of the Loyal Orange Association. Pickpockets were at work on the special train from St. John this morning, and W. M. Campbell, Market street, St. John, was relieved of \$105 between St. John and Moncton, and another man on the same train lost \$11.

An address of welcome was read by Arthur Stone, president of the Moncton lodge of Sons of England. Harry Sellen of St. John, Grand Master of the Orange Boys of Canada, replied. Other speakers were George H. Pugh, Moncton, Col. A. J. Armstrong, St. John, Leonard G. Salisbury and H. E. Heine, Moncton.

The Orange celebration at Plaster Rock yesterday was one of the most enthusiastic demonstrations they have ever had. Thousands gathered from the surrounding district and a thousand men, representing fifteen lodges, took part in the parade. Ten thousand men took part in the Orange parade in Winnipeg. A sudden shower drenched them as they started marching but with dripping clothes they continued on their three mile route to the park where a big picnic was held.

A torrential downpour drenched the 60,000 Orangemen who celebrated the anniversary of the Battle of the Boyne by marching from Belfast, Ireland, to Wh. Abbey, where a speech was made by Fred E. Smith, Unionist leader in the House of Commons. He spoke vigorously against home rule.

Hampton, N. B., July 12--A sad feature of Home Week will be the arrival of C. P. R. train tomorrow of the body of the late Ralph J. Humphrey who died at Calgary, on Saturday last. He was the third son of the late James M. Humphrey, and was born and brought up here, and since his public business life, always made his home headquarters at the old homestead here. The funeral service will be held at the Methodist church, at 3 o'clock, and interment will be in the Hampton cemetery. Mr. Humphrey was always a favorite, both as a boy and man, and the list of his friends is only limited by those who never met him. His brothers, Percy and Guy, of St. John; John, of Calgary; and Mrs. L. Kilham, of Sackville, are the only surviving members of his family.
