



Is Bid in by Mortgagee for \$25 Above Outstanding Charges.

A four-story brick building in King street in the heart of the shopping district of St. John, owned by Macaulay Bros. & Co., Ltd., was sold by auction at Chubb's corner today by Mayor F. L. Potts, auctioneer. The property was knocked down at \$25 above the amount of liabilities outstanding against it, the purchasers being the Imperial Life Insurance Co.
