BRITONS NOT POPULAR

Barred From Exclusive Clubs of New York

Situation Due to Displeasure of Americans at Way in Which They Claim to Have Been Entertained in London.

NEW YORK, April 8.—Englishmen of high social standing belonging to London clubs who were once welcomed to exclusive clubs in this city are now virtually under the ban.

Their friends hesitate to propose them either as visitors or as members, as they are as likely as not to receive a courteous intimation that they would better withdraw the names of their candidates. Several incidents which were seriously near to the old-fashioned "blackballing" have recently occurred, and the country between the social organizations of New York and London has in consequence been seriously disturbed.

This situation has arisen from no antipathy toward individuals, but from the displeasure of Americans at the manner in which they have been entertained at the clubs of the British metropolis, although ostensibly admitted to all the privileges.

They say that they get only to a small portion of a London house and some of them do not even progress to the strangers' room. They may be escorted to some small apartment set apart for foreigners. The hostess, however, or they may be permitted to linger for a while in a corridor. When the Englishman entertains the American, he is maintained in the house as not to take him to some semi-private club.

McGOVERN RELEASED

FROM THE SANITARIUM

STAMFORD, Conn., April 8.—After four months of close confinement in Stamford Sanitarium, Terry McGovern, the former champion pugilist, was released today. He was far from looking the picture of health, and Drs. J. Creamer and D. H. Quinn, of New York, who saw him at the sanitarium before he was released, predicted that he would be "doing things again" within forty-eight hours.

McGovern would not have been released today for his devoted wife. For two months after he entered the sanitarium she was not allowed to see him. During the last two months she has paid at least two visits each week. Every time she called Terry begged that he be taken away.

Yesterday afternoon he insisted that he be released from the sanitarium, and the proprietor telegraphed for Sam Harris, Terry's former manager. Accompanied by Joe Humphreys, Drs. Creamer and Quinn, Walter Moore, of New York, Mrs. McGovern and Terry's stepfather, Joseph Keeney, of Brooklyn, Harris came here this afternoon and took McGovern away from the sanitarium.

Humphreys remained in Stamford with Terry and his wife to look for a cottage. It is proposed to keep McGovern here for at least two months.

An attendant from the sanitarium will be constantly with him, and he will visit the sanitarium every day for treatment.

Today was the first time Terry has been out of doors since he entered the sanitarium.

"I'm going to take a rest out here in the country," he said, "and then I intend to enter business in Brooklyn with my stepfather. I'm going into training for a business life. I feel well and I'm going to try and keep my health. No more fighting or stage work for me. I've cut it all out."

"McGovern's condition is virtually the same today as it was when he entered the sanitarium," said Dr. Creamer. "He had incipient paresis then and the proprietor of the sanitarium agreed with us that Terry by no means a cured case. He has improved physically, but his mind will never again be strong. He will be like a bird released from a cage, and it will be strange if he isn't back in New York doing things again within forty-eight hours."

One of the New York physicians said that McGovern was hale better than a raving maniac in his four last fights. The only thing that enabled him to stand up and fight was continual doses of strong stimulants.

Joe Humphreys said that McGovern was taken out of the sanitarium at his wife's request.
