



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
RIVERSIDE July 2.-An enthusi-EAST CAKES





VICTORIA HARBOR, Ont., July 2.--A disastrous fire broke out here yester-day in Turner's lumber yard, and in spite of every effort to check the flames all the contents of the yard, in-cluding between five and six milion feet of iumber, were consumed. For a time it looked as if the mill would be burned also, but this was saved. Approximately 7,000,000 feet cf lum-ber, 2,000,000 laths, 3,000 railway tles, 50,000 broom handles 13 Grand Trunk cars, 11 tram cars, two 10 foot trams, were destroyed.

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vere destroyed. Fart of the lumber was owned by the Turner Lumber Co., but as Mr. Tur-ner is out of town the amount cannot be ascertained. The cut was valued at between \$125,000 and \$130,000 at mill, and is fully covered by insurance. The origin of the fire is not known.
