PLUNGER HAS A CLOSE CALL

Joe. H. Patton Mobbed on Floor of Manchester Stock Exchange.

LONDON, March 11.—A hostile demonstration on the floor of the cotton exchange at Manchester and on directly in contrast with it for friendliness on the corn exchange at Liverpool were met with today by Joe. H. Patton, the Chicago wheat and corn operator. In the first, Mr. Patton was mobbed and probably escaped by a narrow margin. In the latter he was greeted with cheers and other manifestations of sympathy. Mr. Patton will sail from Liverpool tomorrow for New York on board the Canadian line steamer Mauretania. "The brief vacation in England of the Chicago operator has been spent on duty about the Liverpool markets, and today he made up his mind to run over to Manchester to see the city and visit the cotton exchange. It was known by Mr. Patton that there had been threats of an unpleasant reception should he visit 'Cottonopolis,' but he refused to believe they would be carried out. He was met by a crowd of about 100 persons on the exchange who lost large sums as a result of Mr. Patton's operations in Chicago and from others who felt responsible for yesterday's rise in the price of cotton and believed that his visit to England had for its purpose manipulation of the market."

Hardly had Mr. Patton reached the floor of the Manchester exchange before the outburst came. He was mobbed and jeered by the throng and then surrounded and hustled to the street.

The floor was crowded with members who evinced their sympathy with him for the treatment that had been shown him in Manchester by taking off their hats and cheering him when he referred to the incident in an occurrence similar to the Manchester affair took place on the London exchange after the recent election.

200 MEMBERS NEEDED TO START MOVEMENT

Rev. J. J. McCaskill Addresses Large Meeting on the Co-operative Idea.

An enthusiastic meeting was held last evening in McLean's building, in Union Street, in the interest of the co-operative movement. Rev. J. J. McCaskill addressed the gathering on the movement, which is doing so much for England. He outlined in the beginning of his address, the conditions that must be observed, before the movement could be made a success. There must be at least two hundred co-operators at \$10 each to begin, and they would have to go into the undertaking very enthusiastically. Success depended upon the enthusiasm displayed by the individual co-operators.

Mr. McCaskill recommended a plan to explain the movement to the members of the direct labor unions, and to those who over the campaign for co-operation. Many of them would no doubt join the movement.

Referring to the co-operative movement in England, the speaker said that about one-tenth of the entire trade was carried on by co-operation.

At the conclusion of the meeting about twenty-five of these present signified their desire to join in the movement.
