CONSTITUTION. Article I.

The members of this Supreme Grand Council shall consist of the officers thereof, all past grand masters, past deputy grand masters, past principal conductors of the work, inspectors of divisions or provinces, representatives of other Grand Councils near this Grand Council, past thrice illustrious masters of subordinate councils; and he first three officers, for the time the first three officers, for the time being, of the respective councils under the jurisdiction of this Supreme Grand Council; each of whom shall be en-titled to one vote; who shall have precedence, hold and enjoy rank, re-spectively, according to seniority, dat-ing from the organization of the Grand Council, 14th and 16th days of Au-gust.
