The Timber Licenses to be sold will cover an area of about 2,000 square miles (or 2,000,000 acres) of crown lands.

These licenses will be for one year, with the right of renewal for a term of years from the 1st day of August, 1893, on fulfillment of all conditions of license.

Licenses will be offered at an upset price of \$5.00 per square mile, and may be renewed from year to year during the term on payment of \$4 per square mile; this mileage being in addition to stumpage dues.

The stumpage payable on lumber to be cut has been fixed for the present at the following rates:

On Spruce, Pine and Hemlock Logs, \$1.00 per M. S. p. ft. of Log.

On Lumber as per usual rates.
