BLUES IN S. QUEBECANT FOR PLUGS George B. Caldwell, President of Investment Banker's Association of America, Gives Views.

Chicago, Oct. 26.—George B. Caldwell, president of the Investment Bankers' Association of America, in opening his second annual convention here today said that stocks and bonds were down "almost to panic prices" because of the dissatisfaction of capital with the present and the last administration. For the last two years the security market has reflected the disgust of capital because of the administration of Taft and Wilson seemed determined to irritate and regulate business. The agitation has gone so far that our government at Washington is almost certain to be on the bear side of the market.

"Good stocks and bonds are down almost to panic prices chiefly because of a lack of confidence and a belief on the part of investors that what we will get will be worse than what we have had and that the corporations, especially the railroads will not be given in the next three years a square deal."

Mr. Caldwell, who is president of the Continental and Commercial Trust and Savings Bank of Chicago, said that the thrifty poor would suffer most. "The little people, the host of small investors in stocks and bonds, are the ones who will suffer most from reversion to uneconomic processes."



IN AND AROUND ST. JOHN



Starting brewing lager beer in 1879, and branching into brewing ale and porter in 1891, the business established by James Ready, and taken over in November 1912 by the Ready Breweries Limited, occupies premises covering an area of 32,000 square feet, and buildings five stories high, connected with main line of the C.P.R. at Fairville by a private siding. The capacity of the brewery has grown from small beginnings to an extent that would enable a production of 50,000 barrels per annum, a barrel for every citizen in St. John. The output last year was about 15,000 barrels. Electric power for lighting, elevators, etc., is generated on the premises, and pure water is derived from the artesian wells. The company has a mineral water and bottling plant, established in 1880 in St. John, and now housed in a brick building with an area of 7500 square feet.

DECREASE IN THE EARNINGS OF STEEL CO.

Are, However, in Excess of Corresponding Quarter of 1912—Dividends are Declared. New York, Oct. 28.—Earnings of the United States Steel Corporation for the third quarter of the calendar year, issued today, show a marked decrease compared with the preceding quarter, but are far in excess of the corresponding quarter in 1912. Exclusive of interest on outstanding bonds of subsidiary companies, earnings were \$49,933,531; total income, \$38,450,400. These figures are from \$2,000,000 to \$3,000,000 under the corresponding quarter of 1912. The quarterly earnings of the company for the second quarter, compared with the corresponding quarter of 1912, were \$43,721,633 and \$41,219,913 respectively for the June quarter. Surplus for the quarter is \$13,348,778, as against \$13,619,365 in June and \$24,341,801 in the third quarter of last year. Analyzing the earnings of July, August, and September, it is seen that none of these months compared favorably with the three months of the second quarter. This is in line with general trade reports pointing toward a moderate recession. The total dividends were declared, 1.24 per cent on the preferred stock and 1.14 per cent on the common, involving an outlay of \$12,658,700.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST MINING REGULATIONS.

COAL—Coal mining rights may be leased for twenty-one years, renewable at an annual rental of \$1 an acre, of more than 2,500 acres can be leased to one applicant. Royalty, five cents per ton. In unreserved territory the tract must be staked out by the applicant in person and personal application to the Agent or sub-agent of Dominion Lands for the district, must in all cases be made and the rental for the first year must be paid to the agent within thirty days after filing application.

QUARTZ—A person eighteen years of age and over, having made a discovery may locate a claim 1,000 feet by 1,500 feet. At least \$100 must be expended on the claim each year, or paid to the Mining Recorder. When \$500 has been expended or paid, and other requirements complied with the claim may be purchased at \$1 an acre.

PLACER MINING CLAIMS are 500 feet long and from 100 to 2,000 feet wide. Entry fee, \$5. Not less than \$100 must be expended in development work each year.

PRELIMINARY—Two leases of five miles each of a river are to be issued to one applicant for a term of 20 years. Rental, \$10 a mile per annum. Royalty, 2 1/2 per cent after the output exceeds \$10,000.
