CANADIANS AT HOME GRATEFUL

Sir Edward Kemp, on Behalf of Militiamen at Home, Congratulates Heroes of Vimy Ridge.

Special to The Standard. Ottawa, April 11.—Sir Edward Kemp today sent the following cable of congratulations to Lieut-General Sir Julian Byns, commander of the Canadian troops at the front: "The troops still in Canada awaiting their opportunity to join their comrades at the front, the young Canadians who are about to enlist and the officers and men who have been deprived of the privilege of participating in active operations at the front but who have devoted themselves to the task of raising and organizing the Canadian expeditionary force—on behalf of all these I extend to yourself and the officers and men under your command their warmest congratulations, in which I heartily concur, upon the splendid and inspiring victory of Canadians at Vimy Ridge."

Should Heed the Call. Sir Edward said further that "after such a grand victory which is sure to go down in history as one of the greatest achievements of the war, and an outstanding event in the history of our country, surely young men who have hesitated about enlisting in the overseas forces will under such inspiration heed the call of their fellow countrymen to 'come over and help' and at once put their names in the overseas list."

KNIFE ON CORNS CAUSES LOCKJAW
