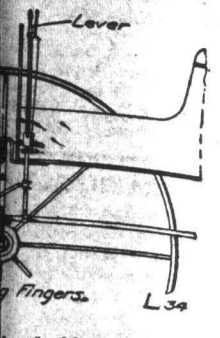

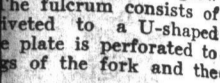

CANADIAN DEAD NEARLY 2,000

Total in Casualty List to Date 10,620 of Whom 1,877 Are Dead, 6,728 Wounded and 2,065 Missing—Halifax Man in 15th Twice Wounded.

Ottawa, Aug. 9—Canadian casualties up to date number 10,620, made up of 1,877 dead; 6,728 wounded, and 2,065 missing.
