

TOBACCO STILL UNSOLD.

LEAMINGTON, Feb. 13.—More than 20,000,000 pounds of tobacco raised in Essex County last year is still in the hands of farmers, according to officials of the Empire Tobacco Company. The crop was not purchased by the tobacco companies because of over-production.

The farmers, it is said, are holding out for 10 cents a pound. This price cannot be paid, it is stated, and unless producers are willing to take 8 or 9 cents the tobacco may remain in the barns. Land that for the last 10 years has been used for growing tobacco will this year be cropped with corn and wheat, farmers say. This will lead to greater hog production in the border county.
