A Story of Bravery That Will Never Die Violated by Invasio

How many Canadians realize the anxiety the British possessions on this continent have at one time and another caused the diplomats of the another caused the diplomats of the States and Great Britain? The trou-ble over boundary lines is tradition-al, but that and the Fenian raid is not the only source of diplomatic correspondence in the past. In fact, just 28 years ago this year Canada was actually invaded by a force of cavalry from the States, and strange to relate there was no call to arms from Her Majesty's warriors, and to relate there was no call to arms from Her Majesty's warriors, and therein lies a decidedly interesting story, a story of warfare, bloodshed and massacre, defeat of United States soldiers and a wild desire for revenge which carried them into Canadian lands in search of their enemy. It was the sequel of the great battle the Sioux and Cheyenne Indians had with General Custer, and the redskins fled into Canada to avoid the infuriated troops who were de-

redskins ned into Canada a vota-the infuriated troops who were de-termined to kill everything with a coppor-colored skin they could find. Indeed, the Indians appeared to have been so frightened by the magnitude of their bloody victory that they of their bloody victory that they never ceased running until they passed over the border and away into British territory, where the wily old Sitting Bull, their chief, understood that he could not be pursued except after correspondence with Washington

It was the spring of 1876, July 25, that General George Custer and his 252 men were slaughtered by Sitting Bull and his red warriors on the plains of the Little Big Horn River in Wyoming. The battle created a sensation. Custer commanded 252 troopers of the Ninth Cavalry when he went into battle and there were just 252 dead white men found on the knoll where they made their stand. In other words none escaped. These men were superbly mounted. It was the spring of 1876, July 25 These men were superbly mounted. Had they broke ranks and fled for their lives, many would have escaptheir lives, many would have escaped. It is a singular comment on their courage that not one attempted to ride away. To-day there is a tiny monument marking the spot where each soldier fell and a big white shaft marks the apex of the hill, the high-water mark of the battle which raged that day. The white stones are beautifully aligned there. The bodies were not found for many days. Then decomposition was too far advanced for removal. Each body was rolled into a grave dug by the side of where it was found.

Custer's force was a part of a big force, nearly two thousand soldiers, under General Crook, sent out to drive the Sioux back to their reser-

under General Crook, sent out to drive the Sioux back to their reservation. Custer was separated by the main body and sent on a scouting expedition. Here he still further divided his force, sending half of his men away under General Reno. This smaller force was near enough to hear the reports of Custer's guns, but could render no relief because of the presence of some fifteen thousand Indians. The Sioux are magnificent horse soldiers and brave in battle. They overwhelmed Custer, though several who took part in the fight said Custer's troops killed hundreds of their braves before they were

said Custer's troops killed hundreds of their braves before they were "wiped out."

One of the sub-chiefs, Rain-in-the-Face, who had a grievance against Captain Thomas Custer, a brother of the general cut out the still quivering heart of his enemy and ate it raw during the conflict. The Indians horribly mutilated every victim but the body of Custer, the chief. They afterwards explained that he was afterwards explained that he was "much heap brave man" and they would neither scalp him nor otherwise mutilate the body. When found he was fully dressed, with his sword lying on his breast. One single bulleting the state of th let wound in the forehead told how he died. All the other dead were stripped of their clothes and cut to

The next day the whole Sioux na The next day the whole Stoke hatton started northward on the run, As soon as General Crook discovered the disaster that had overtaken Custer, he sent his whole force after the Indians. The warriors abandond their families, knowing they would not be injured by the troopers, in or-der that they could move faster. The pursuit was stubborn. Up through the Bear Paw Mountain of Montana purshit was stubborn. Up through the Bear Paw Mountain of Montana fled the frightened Indians and then on across the Milk River and into Assiniboia. The troopers of Crook sever came in sight of the Indians, but kept steadily on. Sitting Bull halted fifty miles over the border, only to find the soldiers were still affur him. Then his force swept on into the Wood Mountains. In the meantime General Crook discovered that he had exceeded his authority and had invaded Canada. He very promptly retreated, though he afterwards asserted that he would have fought a battle with the Indians had he caught up with them, if he had leen on foreign soil or in h—Only the chief men of the tribe, however, remained for any length of time on Eritish soil. Sitting Bull himself remained in Canada for a year, the Government refusing to expel him as long as he was peaceful. The cunning off fellow then went back to the States and was finally shot to death by the Indian scouts at Standing Rock during the Pine Ridge Indian uprising of 1890-1 while they were trying to arrest him for complicity in the "ghost dance" craze.
