THE MONTREAL STRIKE.

Union Leader Says Men Will Remain Firm Until Rights Are Secured.

A Vast Congestion of Grain at the Port—Elevators All Filled to Capacity.

MILITIA TO GET EXTRA PAY.

MONTREAL, May 8.—J. G. O'Neill, the longshoremen's strike leader, today publicly told Hon. Raymond Prefontaine, Minister of Marine, that he had no right to make such a misleading statement as was attributed to him in the interview in Ottawa yesterday, in which it was alleged that the strike leader had informed the Minister that the strike was practically over and that the longshoremen were ready to give in. Mr. O'Neill publicly informed Mr. Prefontaine that instead of the strike being practically over, it had only begun, as far as the men were concerned, and that they would stand firm until they obtained their rights, even if it took all summer. The men, Mr. O'Neill said, had plenty of money and could continue the strike indefinitely. It is announced that the militia on duty at the harbor had been granted an increase of one dollar per day in their pay. It is said the funds necessary for this increase will not come from either government or city, but that some public spirited citizen, whose name is not divulged, has advanced the amount. It is believed that the shipping interests of the port has provided the money. The accumulation of grain in the port of Montreal is becoming a serious feature of the longshoremen's strike. Large quantities of grain are being brought down for shipment and the elevators are said to be filled to their utmost capacity, while barges are lying beside nearly every ship in port awaiting to transfer cargo, but the ocean liners are unable to receive it, and unless the situation is soon relieved a serious grain blockade is imminent. Sir William Mulock met the representatives of the shipping interests and the longshoremen this morning, in reference to the strike. Hon. Mr. Prefontaine and Mr. James McInane, harbor master, were present, in addition to the shipping committee, and Mr. O'Neill, the leader of the longshoremen. The conference is still in progress and it is understood the shipping interests announced their unwavering determination not to give a preference to union men as demanded by the strikers.

SCHOONER UNDER FIRE.

Unique Experience of a Nova Scotia Vessel

During the Recent Troubles at San Domingo.

The Mark for the Guns of Both Governments and Revolutionists.

HALIFAX, May 8.—E. A. O'Brien, the well known ship owner of Hart's County, while in the city yesterday morning received some sensational news from the captain of his schooner Britannia at San Domingo. Captain Nickerson stated in his letter that they had had a thrilling experience, and at the time of writing they were just emerging from danger. For three hours the vessel was between two lines of fire, with revolutionists on the one side and government troops on the other. The Britannia was loading sugar and the captain and crew were compelled to seek refuge in the hold of the vessel. The rigging of the Britannia was riddled with bullets and her sides were also pierced. During the engagement a small gunboat, after being in action made fast to the Britannia in an endeavor to escape a fusillade, but it only had the effect of drawing the fire in that direction.

WESTERN RAILWAYS

Will be Kept Forty Miles Apart to Prevent Duplication.

WINNIPEG, May 8.—The adoption by the Dominion Government of a policy of keeping railways forty miles apart in northwest Canada, when granting future railway charters, as announced by Hon. Mr. Blair, Minister of Railways and Canals, meets with general approval, because additional railway mileage constructed hereafter will all be developing new territory instead of duplicating existing lines in sections already well served.

DEATH IN TORONTO.

Emerson Coatsworth, City Commissioner, Dead at the Age of 78.

TORONTO, May 8.—Emerson Coatsworth, sr., city commissioner for many years, and one of the oldest civic officers in dead, aged 78. He was for many years prominent in public affairs, having been an alderman and a candidate for the House of Commons when he was defeated by Hon. John O'Donoghue in East Toronto. He was a Methodist of prominence.

N. S. DELEGATION

At Ottawa With Reference to I. C. R. Extension.

OTTAWA, May 8.—Rev. Mr. Macpherson and Rev. Mr. McMillan, of Cape Breton, are here interviewing Hon. A. G. Blair on the proposed line of I. C. R. from North Sydney to Sydney Mines.

INDIAN COMPLAINT.

OTTAWA, May 8.—A deputation of Oka Indians waited upon Sir Wilfrid Laurier this morning to complain that the Sulpician Fathers were again interfering with Indians cutting wood, and to ask his protection and the continuance of what they claim to be their right.

MOAT HOUSE MYSTERY.

The British Officer Who is Now Charged With Murder

Formerly Served at Halifax With Engineers.

Married Two Wives While There, Both of Whom Died.

HALIFAX, May 8.—Lieut. Dougal, under arrest in England in connection with the Moat House mystery, charged with the murder of Miss Holland, was at one time a sergeant in the Royal Engineers at Halifax. During his stay in this city he married two different Halifax ladies, and yesterday the military authorities received a request from the British authorities for information regarding the way and manner in which his two wives met their death. Dougal was well known in business circles in this city and being an exceptionally handsome man he was very popular. There was no suspicion of foul play in connection with the death of either woman at the time.

RUSSIAN AGGRESSION.

New Chwang Being Fortified by the Despoilers of China.

PERKIN, May 8.—The Russians are reported to be constructing forts on the hills near Liao Yung, commanding the road between there and the Liao river, and they have arranged to have a large quantity of provisions delivered at New Chwang, via a despatch from an official at New Chwang, who says indications point to these active preparations being intended to forward operations against the Russians in Manchuria.

The news of Russian activity, which comes from a most trustworthy source at New Chwang, adds that on the return to New Chwang the Russian troops brought with them several large guns.

A large force has been ordered to occupy Tien Chwang Tai. The Russians have 10,000 troops between the mouth of the Liao River and Fort Arthur.

LONDON, May 8.—The announcement from Pekin that the Russians have recaptured New Chwang must not be understood as simply that they have not evacuated the place. The news is taken here to mean that the town has been recaptured by the force withdrawn in April, when the Russian said that all the troops except the men necessary for the police guard had been removed.

DOMINION STEEL.

Senator Forget Does Not Credit Story of Whitney's Retirement.

MONTREAL, May 8.—Senator Forget stated this morning that he did not understand the rumor that Whitney and Dimock intended to retire from the directorate of the Dominion Steel and Coal Companies. The Senator said that when these gentlemen were in the city a week ago they did not give any hint of such intentions.

NEGROES HANGED.

ST. LOUIS, May 8.—Henry Wilson and Sampson Gray, negroes, were hanged in the jail yard today for murder. It is the first double hanging here since 1888. It was the first private execution in the history of St. Louis, a few officials and newspaper men being the only persons present.
