	15 Sept./44	Friday	<p>The Commanding Officer's Parade, deferred from Wednesday, was held on this morning and all ranks were congratulated on the smartness of dress and deportment. A short route march was enjoyed by all on conclusion of the inspection. The Station Band participated at a Sports Day and Dance held by R.C.A.F. Station, Edmonton.</p>	
	16 Sept./44	Saturday	<p>The health of the Station remains good although more head colds have been occasioned by the hot and cold weather we have been having for the past two weeks. There are only two patients in the Station Hospital, although 8 personnel from this Unit are at present in other hospitals. Two ladies of the No. 4 I.T.S., Women's Auxiliary visited the hospital this morning as usual bringing cheer and especially cigarettes and magazines to the patients. The Station Band played at a Concert in aid of the War Savings Stamp Drive presently in progress from 14:30 to 15:30 hours this afternoon and in the evening played at a dance of the American Supply Depot. Since notification has been received of this Unit's disbandment, more and more postings have been received which have and will continue to disrupt the efficient operation and closing of this Unit. In an effort to have key men remain, a nominal roll of all personnel required is being despatched to 4 T.C.H.Q., in the hope that the personnel required may be permitted to remain until disbandment. The continual posting of officers is necessitating the rapid turn over of inventories and it is hoped that with the submission to Command Headquarters of a nominal roll of key personnel that posting can be stabilized and further reduce the great amount of work required in continually checking inventories.</p>	
	17 Sept./44	Sunday	<p>The Wing Church Parade normally held the second Sunday of the month, was deferred in September until this morning in order that the Anniversary of the Battle of Britain could be commemorated. Plans were made to conduct the Service on the lawn of the Normal School and notice to this effect was given to the newspapers with an invitation to civilians to attend a drum-head service. Previous Services have been conducted on the lawn and it is a most pleasant setting. This morning however, the city was lashed with a rain and sleet storm accompanied by a very high wind which precluded any possibility of carrying out the plans. The weather was such that it was not practical to march from the Drill Hall where the parade formed to the Auditorium approximately a quarter of a mile distant, accordingly personnel remained standing throughout the Service which was conducted in the Drill Hall. These circumstances detracted in no manner from the Service which was conducted by the Station Chaplain (P) F/L W.G. Greenfield (C28808).
