LIBERAL COMMENDATION.

CHANCELLOR BOYD AGAIN.

Chancellor Boyd has bobbed up again. This is the gentleman who eame down off the bench to the hoped-for resuce of the Strattonites who had handed out so many lucrative berths to himself and family, and on a pronouncement admittedly at variance with the evidence "condemned" Mr. Gamey. Shortly after it will be remembered-about Jan. 25th last-the people of Ontario rather emphatically reversed the decision and condemned Mr. Chancellor. Boyd and his finding. Still more recently the Legislature passed a resolution that further specifically recorded the public estimate placed upon this public servant and his "judgments."

The other day this gentleman handed out "judgment" in the Soo election cases. He said that Coyne could not be punished for using the Minnie M. as a conveyance to carry the pluggers to the scene of operations. Here is the pronouncement:

"We do not find any fine can be "We do not find any fine can be imposed on Ooyne for using the steamer Minnie M. The statute contemplates transportation by land and not on water. 'Railway carriages, cabs, carts or any conveyance,' are the words used, and on this point we do not think the word 'conveyance' can be so enlarged as to take ance' can be so enlarged as to take

And this is the law:

And this is the law:

"Every elector who hires a horse, cab, cart, wagon, sleigh, carriage or other conveyance for a candidate, or for an agent of a candidate, or sides or furnishes or pays for the railway conveyance or, transportation of voters as aforesaid, shall ipso facto be disqualified from voting at the election, and for every such offense shall incur a penalty of \$100."

A layman, reading that paragraph,

A layman, reading that paragraph would very naturally conclude that Coyne had broken the law, inasmuch as he used a steamboat, the Minnie M., as a "conveyance" to "convey" the pluggers. Indeed, if the layman seeks for information in the dictionary his first impression will be confirmed, for the Standard dictionary man will tell him that a conveyance is "that by which anything is conveyed or transported, or which serves as a means or way of carriage." Other dictionary men give similar definitions. Any layman will admit that a steamboat is a very good "means or way of carriage," and that it is something by which something is "conveyed or transported."

But the dictionary man is not a learned judge like Mr. Chancellor Boyd.

A great many people go down to the Rankin dock in this city laboring under the erroneous impression that they will there find a conveyance to convey them to Detroit and back. It is true that they go on board the steamer. steamer' proceeds to Detroit and return: but the legal fact seems to be that they were not conveyed from the Chatham wharf at all. And inasmuch as they had not been telegraphed, or telephoned to Detroit, or fired there out of a gun, or picked up and chucked to Detroit by a strong man, it is evident that they labored under an incomprehensible delusion when they imagined they had been visiting Detroit.

And if the lay seeker for informa tion flies to the law books he will again be delusively encouraged. The first law book that comes to hand chances to be The Statutes of Canada, 2 Edward VII., 1902, and we find therein the charter of a steamboat company, which is empowered to "operate steam and other boats and vessels and therewith carry on the business of conveying goods, wares and merchandise, freight and cargoes of all descriptions as well as passen-gers." One would instantly suppose that a boat which is used for "conveying" passengers was a convey-ance. But according to Mr. Chancellor Boyd it is not,

Mr. Job tells how he visited what is perhaps the last large remaining aigret rookery in North Americe.

It should be understood that these plumes, which are variously called by milliners "aigrets." "slubs" and "ospreys," and are dyed to whatever color is fashionable, are borne only during the nuptial season and can be secured only by shooting the birds when they have assembled in colonies to breed, when their usual shyness has departed owing to the strength of the parental instinct. Returning to their nests, they are shot down, and their young are left to starve.
