TUMULT IN THE DIET.

Hungarian Legislators Create a Scene.
Budapest, Sept. 25.—In the Diet the charges made against Premier Hedyvary of complicity in the Szapary bribery scandal started a disturbance. When it had somewhat subsided Franz Kossuth handed in an address to the Emperor-King complaining against his Majesty's recent army order and the interpretation given to the constitution in yesterday's rescript. When Count Hedyvary rose to reply the uproar was so great that he was unable to make his voice heard. The deputies left their seats and crowded upon the floor of the House, and the sitting had to be suspended. On the resumption of business, Count Hedyvary was speaking, when he was suddenly interrupted by Barabass, a member of the Kossuth party, who shouted "We don't believe the King." Thereupon the deputies, irrespective of party, rose, with shouts of "Rogue!" "Traitor!" "Out with him!" etc. Barabass tried to apologize, but his colleagues refused to permit it, and a vote of censure upon Barabass was recorded on the minutes. The Diet was finally adjourned until the new Cabinet is formed.

HUNGARIANS TO REBEL.

Startling Despatch to London Daily Mail.

London, Sept. 25.—The London Daily Mail's correspondent at Berlin telegraphs the sensational statement that there is a possibility of a Kossuthist revolution in Hungary. He says that as a result of the German Emperor's visit to Vienna, Germany has promised to assist Austria with troops should Austria face the necessity of sending an army to Macedonia, and simultaneously of suppressing a Hungarian revolution. That the latter is not impossible, continues the correspondent, may be gathered from the fact that General Von Beck, chief of the Austrian Staff, submitted a plan of mobilization to Emperor William last week. The idea of placing Prince Eitel Frederick, the second son of the German Emperor, on the Hungarian throne, receives no support in Germany.

SIR E. BARTON A JUDGE.

Important Change in the Ministry of Australia.
London, Sept. 25.—Sir Edmund Barton has been appointed one of the Judges of the Australian Federal High Court, and has resigned the Premiership. The Hon. Alfred Deakin is now Premier. He has been Attorney-General since 1901.

REPRESENT MAXIM CO.

British Capitalists Favorable to Soo Investment.
Toronto, Sept. 25.—The anxiety among Canadian creditors of the Consolidated Lake Superior Company appears to have been considerably lessened as a result of Mr. Clergue's visit to Toronto on Wednesday, his interview with the Government, and the definite and authoritative announcement that British capitalists are ready to make investment in the Sault Ste. Marie industries if favorable terms can be arranged.

Messrs. A. R. Harvery, A. P. Wilson and Captain T. C. Tulloch, who began their negotiations with Mr. Clergue at Sault Ste. Marie last week, and have now accompanied him to New York and Philadelphia, it is understood, came to Canada in the interests of the business of Vickers Sons & Maxim, Limited, the great gun and armament manufacturers of Sheffield, England, and other British companies of equal prominence.

The Armstrong Company, rival manufacturers of war material, have already secured considerable interests in nickel and iron deposits in northern Ontario, particularly those held and operated by Dr. Ludwig Mond, and the increased utility of nickel, not only in the manufacture of armor plate, but also for guns, had impressed the Maxim Company with the necessity for also obtaining a share in the source of supply in Canada. It is understood that it was for this purpose that some of the gentlemen at present with Mr. Clergue came to this country.

At the same time, Mr. W. B. Cloete, one of the directors of the Maxim Company, has also been visiting northern Ontario, ostensibly on a fishing trip, and the presence of all these gentlemen has given them the chance to investigate all the conditions surrounding the Soo industries, and a substantial interlocking of the company at a comparatively small outlay on account of the present embarrassment.

New York, Sept. 24.—Speyer & Co. today issued a circular announcing that the Consolidated Lake Superior and other securities for the loan of \$500,000 are to be sold at public auction at 12 o'clock noon on Thursday, October 1, at the offices of Adrian H. Muller & Sons, auctioneers, No. 161 Broadway. The terms of the sale are that the securities, etc., must be bid for and purchased in one parcel, and Speyer & Co. reserve the right to bid in the properties offered for sale. After enumerating the assets, the circular concludes:

NARROW ESCAPE.

ELECTRIC LIGHTS.

Several complaints are being made about the electric lights. A citizen says that the one on Lacroix street between Patterson avenue and the Grand Trunk track has not been lit for some time and the fact that there is no sidewalk there makes it very inconvenient for pedestrians. An other resident on Park Avenue said that in going home from King street last night he only saw five lights burning. Another resident, over the creek, said that he saw one burning on his way home.

INCENDIARIES AT KINGSTON.

Burning of the Gunshed in Artillery Park—Burning Shells.

Kingston, Sept. 25.—Within twelve hours Kingston has lost two historical military buildings by fire. The first blaze occurred in the forenoon, when the old cavalry stables on Bagot street were almost wholly wiped out. The second blaze broke out during the night, when the old gun shed in Artillery Park was found to be on fire, and before the flames were subdued the shed was damaged beyond repair. The loss is over \$8,000. The evidence all points to incendiarism. There will be an investigation. Two field gun limbers and a field force, as well as all the saddlery and gun harness saved from the morning fire were destroyed. A number of cordite and shrapnel shells burst during the fire, endangering the lives of the fire workers. A number of officers' lost harness that was stored in the building.

"Fox Smith" Captured.

Galt, Sept. 24.—Information from a reliable source reached Galt this afternoon to the effect that "Fox Smith," burglar and safe-cracker, has at last been caught and is now in Ogdensburg, N.Y., jail, awaiting extradition.
