MEMORANDA.
The *Thomas Ritchie*, arrived on Sunday, re-
ports the ship *Stirling*, from Liverpool, wrecked at
Malbay, near Gaspe, bound to Quebec, laden
with salt and goods. The *Thomas Ritchie* brought
up ten of the crew of the *Lady Ann*, of Newcastle,
wrecked on the Island of Anticosti, about six miles
from the wreck of the *Archley Castle*.
Her Majesty's steam ship *Medea* arrived at Pion-
ton on the 9th instant, and was expected to arrive
at Halifax on the 11th.
The *Pearl* sailed from Halifax for Bermuda on
the 9th instant, and the *Crescent* on the 9th.

tination after the arrival of the *Medea* at Halifax.
The schooner *Shannon* cleared at Halifax on the
10th instant, for Montreal, with an assorted cargo.

QUARTER SESSIONS OF THE PEACE.
The October Term of the General Quarter
Sessions of the Peace opened yesterday.
Messrs. L. F. Dufresne, W. B. Lindsay,
and Charles Cazeau, on the Bench.
A very respectable Grand Jury was sworn
in; and Mr. J. B. Frochette appointed Fore-
man.
The Court charged the Grand Jury to the
effect that the calendar of offences which
would be laid before them, was not of great
magnitude, nor distinguished by anything
particular beyond the regular routine of busi-
ness brought before the Quarter Sessions.
From the respectability and intelligence of
the Grand Jurors who had been sworn in,
the Court anticipated an easy and expeditious dis-
patch of affairs during the present session.
The lists of Witnesses, Petty Jurors, At-
tended on Bail and Process, were called over,
ulterior days were appointed for the trial of
several cases which had been fixed for this
day, and the Court adjourned.

At the last term of the Court of King's
Bench of this District, a wife sued her hus-
band for a *separation de bien et de corps*,—
the grounds set up being that she did not
understand one word of French, and that her
partner, to whom she had been married for
the space of *four days* was equally ignorant
of the English language! The woman ob-
tained judgment in her favour.

On the 10th October, a meeting of the Cath-
olics of the Diocese of Kingston, was held at
that place, at which Bishop McDonnell pre-
sided. His coadjutor, Dr. Gaulin, 17 clergy-
men, and a number of gentlemen from different
parts of Upper Canada were present. An ad-
dress was voted to Lord Durham, complaining
of secret societies, Orange processions; the
King's College regulations, and the differences
between the Clergy Reserves, praying that they
may be equitably and speedily settled. The
address also solicits Lord Durham to remain
in the Government; and expresses the fullest
confidence in him.

The Bishop and Dr. Gaulin, the Rev. Angus
McDonnell and Dr. Rolfe, were named as a
deputation to proceed to England with a mem-
orial, and subscriptions opened to cover the ex-
penses.

The Governor General has directed that the
salary and emoluments accruing to His Ex-
cellency as Governor of this Province, shall
be appropriated to the expence incurred in the
repairs of the Government House at Quebec
and Montreal.—*Mercury*.

A characteristic manifestation of the spirit
which pervades the frontier community, late-
ly took place at Rochester. On the evening
subsequent to the public examination of the
principal school of that city, the pupils have
what is called an "exhibition"—that is, they
deliver addresses purporting to be of their own
composition. On the last occasion of the kind
the burden of all the oratory of these un-
fedged sucklings was the "tyranny of the
British Government," the "sufferings of the
Canadian patriots," &c. Thus the "spirit of
76," as they call it—that is, the spirit of deep
and bitter hatred towards every thing British,
is rampant throughout society, from the u-
n-graduate on the bench, and the minister of
peace in his pulpit, down to the unbreached
whisper at his horn-book.

In looking over the advertisements in some
of the American newspapers, which the
"most plentiful lack" of news sometimes
leads us to do, we occasionally find consider-
able novelty and amusement; for instance,
in one New-York paper an individual an-
nounces, that "after years of the most intense
study, and with the blessing of Heaven, he is
enabled to cure all diseases!" a second has
"commenced to manufacture glass eyes that
perform all the movements of natural ones!"
and a third offers for sale "Conservative
Blacking for nourishing boots" (Wellington,
no doubt); but the quintessence of quackery
is here—
"Extraordinary Education!—One Lesson
Only!!—Any person who wishes to play 50
or 100 tunes on the Piano, Guitar, Accordion,
Flute, and Violin, thoroughly and correctly
by note; or learn a good hand writing, can
positively do either, in only one lesson of six
hours, under the celebrated instruction of
Professor GOWARD, of Amherst College, uni-
versally acknowledged to be the first teacher
in the world. Terms—What the lady or gen-
tlemen chooses to give. N. B. What can be
fitter?"
