Smith, a C.P.R. telegraph operator at Sorsmith, a C.F.R. telegraph operator at sol-tin, near Montreal, was on Sept. 4, sentenc-ed to six months imprisonment, for being intoxicated whilst on duty, and on Sept. 5, A. L. Parent, a G.T.R. telegraph operator at the Montreal and Southern Counties Ry.
