Delayed Decision of Battle in France Unfavorable to Germans.

BERLIN, Oct. 9.—The gravity of the situation in France is admitted by the German general staff, and Major Morath, the Tageblatt's military expert, says that the delayed decision of the present battle is unfavorable to the Germans.

An official announcement says that the German progress at Antwerp continues and that the German forces already are over the flooded area along the River Nethe.

A SUNDAY SERMON BY PASTOR RUSSELL

DISTRESS OF NATIONS WITH PERPLEXITY
"A Time of Trouble Such as Never Was."

CLASHING PRAYERS ASCEND
Great Confusion of Thought—The Present War Long Foretold in Prophecy—All Nations to Be Involved—Inefficiency of All Gentile Kingdoms to Bring Lasting Peace—Need of Divine Interposition—Nebuchadnezzar's Dream of Gentile Supremacy—"Times of the Gentiles" Now Expiring—The World's Hope—Messiah's Kingdom.

October 4.—Pastor Russell's discourse to-day was strictly up to date. He took for his text the Master's words, "Upon the earth distress of nations shall be with perplexity; the sea and the waves roaring; men's hearts failing in them for fear, and for looking after those things that are coming on the earth." (Luke 21:25, 26.)

Never was there such a war as there is at the present time. Peculiar conditions have arisen, more so than has ever been known before in the history of the world. With the pending, present conditions seem to take on a peculiar force as we think of that relationship God has to all these matters.

On every hand prayers for peace are ascending to God. Some are praying for the success of the allied armies—which means the slaughter of the Germans, Austrians and Hungarians; others are praying that the war shall not go on. All this shows great confusion of thought. How could all these prayers be heard? The Master has told us that we are to pray in accord with the Word of God. Therefore, before we pray on the subject, it would be well to determine what are God's purposes in regard to this war, and His arrangements in connection with His Almighty will to do, we should all hearken to His Word, and take note of what He says about this war, and the terrible "Time of Trouble such as never was since there was a nation."

As I read my Bible with clearer eyes than once I read it, many things differ from what I thought that I have great sympathy with people who are confused on this matter. As I read the Bible, God has foretold what is happening to-day. Through the Prophet Joel He has said to all nations, "Let the weak say, I am strong, and believe him perfectly honorable in all business transactions and financially able to carry out any obligations made by his firm."

It shall be given to the King of the Babylonians." (Ezekiel 1:1-2)

When God took away His typical kingdom, 606 B.C., He gave the title authority in permission to do their best to rule and govern the world and to bring in righteousness. That we might know all this, He gave a dream to Nebuchadnezzar, King of Babylon, and sent the interpretation of the dream through Daniel, the Prophet. The dream showed a great image, whose head was of gold, representing Babylon; the

SUNDAY SCHOOL

Lesson II.—Fourth Quarter, For Oct. 11, 1914.

THE INTERNATIONAL SERIES.
Text of the Lesson, Mark xiv, 12-25. Memory Verses, 22, 23—Golden Text, 1 Cor. xii, 26—Commentary Prepared by Rev. D. M. Stearns.

The record of this last evening on which He kept the passover and instituted what we call the Lord's supper is found more or less fully in each of the four gospels. Luke says that He sent Peter and John, saying, "Go and prepare us the passover, and that they said unto Him, 'Where wilt thou that we prepare?'" (Luke xxii, 8, 9.)

They were to follow him into a house and say to the good man of the house, 'The Master saith, where is the guest chamber where I shall eat and pass over with my disciples?' (Verses 13, 14; Luke xxii, 10, 11.) It does not seem that the man bearing the water vessel knew what he was doing, but that he all unconsciously guided the men to the right house.

We are often unconsciously guiding people rightly or wrongly, for "Doth He not see my ways and count all my steps?" (Job xxxi, 4.)

The owner of the house must have been a disciple, for he understood and showed them the upper room furnished. Thus they found as He fulfilled in them (verse 15; see also Luke xix, 28).

So shall we always find it to be as He has said. The words translated "guest chamber" are found in only one other place besides this incident, and that is in Luke ii, 7, "No room for them in the inn." There they made ready the passover. What a privilege and honor and pleasure to make anything ready for Him! Do you find it so? He sat down with them in the evening. He said that He had greatly desired to eat this passover with them before He suffered, but that He would not eat it again as He fulfilled in them (verse 16; see also Luke xix, 28).

When we think of the appalling loss of life amongst these angry nations, it is grand to know that this bitter experience are not lost, and that the poor creatures who have suffered are not, when they die, hurried into eternal torment—that poor creatures, not knowing what they are about, but in doing so demonstrating to the best of their ability their patriotism, are not thrown to the devil to be forever roasted. Ah, not so! According to the Scriptures, they are falling asleep, and will be all over for present. They will know nothing more until He who has redeemed them will call them forth from the dominion of death.

The present war will weaken the nations, not only of their life-blood, but also of their wealth; and it will demonstrate the inefficiency of all Gentile kingdoms, and the also be to conquer the world. The rise of Socialism, and their hearts are failing them, fearing the things coming upon the earth.

While they knew that this world was the worst war ever known, yet they preferred it to that which they were striving to ward off and which they have succeeded in keeping off for the present. But they have lost their best blood. Their best energy, their money, commerce, etc., and when the war is ended, these nations will be sorrowful and famine-stricken, and the greatly angered at their rulers. Then will come the determination for something like Socialism. This the governments will endeavor to put down, and to some extent they will succeed. Then will come the great explosion of the Armageddon of the Scriptures. Then will be the Time of Trouble, immediately preceding the Messianic Kingdom.
