HUN FLEET OUTWITTED BY RUSSIAN

Naval Units in Riga Gulf Make Master Stroke For Liberty

RETREAT FROM MOON Apparently Bottled Up By Enemy, Russians Escaped Neatly

SITUATION SUMMARY Enemy Paying Heavy Price For Activity in the Air

Russian naval units in the northern part of the Gulf of Riga have outwitted the superior German forces which have escaped from Moon Sound where they apparently had been bottled up after the engagement in and about the Sound last week.

The Russian warships made their escape without losses and are in a position of protecting the northern entrance to Moon Sound.

The new position of the Russian fleet probably will compel the Germans to give battle if they wish to enter the Gulf of Finland by going through the Sound between Dagö Island and the coast of Estonia.

The military forces in the Moon Sound region were moved successfully by the Russians, who also rescued their transports and smaller craft, submarine at a German dreadnaught and his recovery is doubtful.

In addition to the warships and transports already reported sunk by the Russian fleet, Petrograd reported the sinking of another German transport by a Russian submarine.

Two torpedoes were fired by the Russian submarine at a German dreadnaught of the Markgraf type vessels of 25,000 tons displacement.

Being attacked by the submarine, the Russian fleet was forced to retreat and to note results. One torpedo detonated and the submarine on rising again saw clouds of smoke.

Berlin officially admits the loss of four Zeppelins of the squadron which raided England Friday night.

General English cities and ports were attacked with "special success," Birmingham, London, Manchester, Birmingham and Hull.

In Flanders the artillery activity continues to be violent, while British airplanes have been busy raiding German airbases and other military points behind the German lines.

Hundreds of bombs have been dropped on the airbases and railway stations at Roulers, Courtrai, Incheun and Gontrode and on German billets.

On Sunday British aviators made a raid into Germany and bombarded with excellent results a foundry and railway junction ten miles north of Starbrücken, northeast of Metz.

Nine German machines were downed by the British aviators and four others were driven down out of control.

Emperor William returns to Berlin to-day and among his engagements are political conferences with Prince von Bielow and Dr. von Bethmann-Hollweg, the former Imperial Chancellors.

Prince von Bielow has been mentioned as the probable successor of Dr. Michaelis, whose position as Chancellor, recent reports from Germany have indicated, is most insecure.

The Japanese steamer Hifachi Maru from Yokohama for Liverpool is three weeks overdue at Delagoa Bay, Portuguese East Africa, and is believed to have struck mine, with the loss of all on board.

(Continued from page one) position, the shape of the rump of the Liberal party and Laurier's outside of Quebec, it was inconceivable that Laurier and his adherents could receive any considerable support.

No French domination. Charges that the Borden Government had been placed in power in 1911 by the Nationalist party in Quebec, Mr. Scott cited numerous instances of the Liberal Government's policy, on all of these vital questions had Borden taken a clear cut stand, and in opposition to the sentiments of French Nationalist party.

The Conservative party had stood even for the protection of the workingman and for industrial development, and in the present war was found splendid justification for such a platform, for if the war had taught the world one lesson, it was the lesson that an agricultural nation could not stand against an industrial nation. No better exemplification could be found than the failure of Russia, an agricultural nation, against Germany, an industrial nation. Through out, the present war was being fought by machinery.

The outstanding feature of the war had been Canada's position in the world, the Dominion supplying a great proportion of the allied needs. Had Canada followed the reciprocity policy advocated by the Liberal party in 1911, she would not be in the splendid position in which she stood.

On the other hand, the government had been made against the speaker's expressed confidence that when history was written, and the whole situation faced up, it would be found that no country involved in the war had had a straighter, more honorable administration than Canada. Insofar as the Cabinet members were concerned, while the opportunities for irregularities had been great, not the shadow of suspicion attached to any member. Here was a record of the Borden administration during its term of office. Now all praise was due to Borden for his courage and success with which he had worked for a better government, and most assuredly the loyalty and the loyal words of Canada would support such an Administration that had for which it stood.

Mr. Scott's remarks elicited frequent applause.

F. D. Reville. "Twenty years ago," observed Mr. F. D. Reville, who was next called upon, "I was at another nomination in Paris to help with you to give a man named John Fisher a push into Parliamentary life. Look what he has got to. He didn't appear to me that period of political chrysalis that day, when his wings in the Upper Chamber, where nothing can disturb him, perhaps the more of a fellow Senator."

Speaking from years of close acquaintance with Col. Cockshutt, Mr. Reville said he believed that they could have selected a more representative candidate, nor one more of our own country.

constituency and of the Dominion at large. Col. Cockshutt closed the convention with a brief appeal for cooperation of all to bring about victory in the campaign, and a pledge to do all in his power for the cause of the country. He felt it his duty to go to parliament, and so for that reason was prepared to step out of the fight at any moment if they thought a better man could be selected.

During the course of the proceedings, Dr. Johnston read a letter which had been received from the local Liberal Association, suggesting a joint convention to name a union Government candidate. The convention was treated with the utmost courtesy and it was decided to meet when plans for the existing convention were already completed.
