

## LIVELY TIMES ON THE RIVER

Many Boats Arrive From Below  
With Heavy Cargoes.Stage of Water Falling Fast—The  
Susie Makes a Round Trip to  
St. Michael in Short Order.

The S.-Y. T. Co.'s boats, Seattle No. 3 and Seattle No. 1, arrived in port this week, each laden with a fine line of provisions to the amount of nearly 500 tons. With the No. 3 was a huge barge, on which was the major portion of the boat's load. The boats were tied up at the company's new dock, where a handsome new warehouse is just being completed. Captain De Puy, the master of the No. 3, is a widely known gentleman and a skipper of peerless qualities. His passengers up river included the following: J. McMillan, of Vancouver; J. H. Preston, a Rampart attorney; J. J. Crawley, of the Ladue Mining Co.; Mrs. Miller, J. McGillovray and Mr. Phillips.

The Seattle No. 1 is officered as follows: Captain White, First Officer Burgesen, Chief Engineer Lewis, Second Engineer Allen. Judge Wood, the president of the company, acted as purser on the up trip, owing to the absence of the regular official.

The A. C. Co.'s handsome steamer Susie, Captain Dolson, arrived from St. Michael on her second trip for the season Wednesday evening. The round trip from Dawson was made in a little less than 22 days, an achievement of which the crew are very proud. The boat brought up a large cargo of hardware, and 20 tons of canned coal for the fire steamer. The boat also carried the following passengers: Mrs. M. Walker, T. B. Jacky, A. E. Anderson, J. Men working on the night shift unloading steamer Seattle No. 3 were very pleasantly surprised when the clock struck 12 on Wednesday night by receiving an invitation from the officers of the ship to join them at supper. As there were between 40 and 50 men employed, it meant no small trouble for those who had the preparation of the supper in charge; but, to judge by the spread they gave the boys, they did not appear to mind it. The tables were set with a repast that would have done credit to a swell hotel on the outside. That the men appreciated the kindness of the company goes without saying, and many were the expressions of good will as they returned to work.

The Willie Irving was obliged to give up the effort to reach White Horse, whither she started Saturday, and turned back from a point near Stewart. The trouble was in the new boiler, which had not been packed. The passengers were transferred to the Bonanza King and Columbian.

The Seattle No. 3 brought in some thawing machines for Prof. Lippey's claim, No. 16 Eldorado.

The week has been one of the liveliest in shipping circles in the history of the river. Nine large boats were tied to the levee at one time, and the sight was a rarely edifying one.

The stage of water is falling fast and navigating has become one of the fine arts.

Steward O'Malley of the Victorian is a loyal friend of his craft and thinks there are none can equal it on the upper river. He became a bit excited while advancing its merits the other night and, stripping off about \$300 worth of nugget jewelry, he offered to wager it all that the boat can beat anything in the service to White Horse and back.

## Embezzled Three Thousand.

Thomas M. Graham is a man whom fate designed to have much trust reposed

in him, but who was left by fickle nature without the attributes which would have sustained him in the trials. Last fall he was a trusted clerk of J. Rosenberg, proprietor of the New York store, and when the latter went outside he left Graham in charge of his store, with the only restriction that the profits of the business should be turned over to Ben Levy. During Mr. Rosenberg's absence, Mr. Levy asked Graham for the moneys which he had reason to believe had accrued, but he was given only \$750, Graham confessing that he had drunk up the balance. Graham, it is said, continued to indulge in liquor to such an extent that he was finally sent to a hospital with a case of delirium tremens. Mr. Rosenberg finally arrived home over the ice and he got no better satisfaction than did Mr. Levy. He then took an invoice of his stock, with the result that he became convinced Graham had done away with about \$3000 of his money. Graham was finally arrested, at his instance, and on Thursday, after a hearing before Colonel Steele, was remanded for trial before the territorial court. Graham's friends are exceedingly grieved over his trouble, as he is naturally an honest man, though weak.

## POLICE COURT NEWS.

J. F. Gill, of Sixty Mile, was brought down on a charge of selling liquors during prohibited hours. He was found guilty and fined \$50 and costs.

The case against George Lion, for selling liquor during prohibited hours, was concluded on Thursday, when a fine of \$100 and costs was imposed.

Mr. Barbuso, the son of Italy who, it is charged, foolishly impersonated an absent friend and recorded a claim in his name, was released on bail furnished by some friends.

Chas. A. Damon became involved in a wordy altercation at the Yukon hotel and was ejected by Mr. Dresser, the manager, whereupon he brought an action for assault and Mr. Dresser was fined \$5 and costs.

Mrs. Lizzie Davis tearfully represented to the court that a huge and vicious dog owned by H. Groetschier had cruelly murdered her little woolly poodle with a single snap of his awful jaws, and the court took steps to see that the animal is at once put into a safe condition behind a muzzle.

A. W. Hall, a merchant, criticized C. Bets, ticket seller at the Klondike bridge, for keeping a cheap pair of scales. Mr. Bets took offense and ejected the other from the bridge, whereupon he was arrested on a charge of assault preferred by Mr. Hall. Defendant admitted putting the other off, but said he had not used more than the necessary amount of force.

Nellie Lamore, a former actress at the Monte Carlo, theater, sued her former employee, E. M. Sullivan, for \$150 alleged to be due her on contract. The defendant set up that Nellie had violated her contract by leaving the theatre one night about 2 o'clock in the company of a young man and that he had therefore terminated her employment. Judgment was reserved.

Julius Goddard, a merchant, was arrested at the instance of Mrs. Hampton, charged with selling decayed eggs. She testified that she bought a quantity of eggs from Mr. Goddard to sell at her own store, and that everybody who bought from her took the eggs back. Dr. Good, the health officer, testified that he had examined Goddard's stock of eggs and found them to be generally rotten. "He buys the rottenest eggs he can find," said the indignant physician. "I broke a number of them and couldn't stand it to remain there. The eggs are old enough to walk." The court finally dismissed the case, but cautioned Goddard to deal no more in the fragrant food.
