

The above cut gives a very fair representation of our new Wharfedale press, which weighs in the neighborhood of four tons. Two men can easily lift the whole boiler, engine and attachments, the boiler holding less than three pails of water when running. After six years trial we are certain that 30c, worth of fuel oil will furnish motive power sufficient to run any ordinary press for a period of nine hours.


