It seems that the Ross Government has more ways than one for its school book monopolists to fleece the public. By charging double prices to parents the revenues are appairently not augmented rapidly enough, so the department keeps on authorizing change after change in text books, until neither pupils, parents, teachers, nor booksellers know where they are at. But the favored clique, who control the publication of these books make a fat thing out of it and thus the main exouse for the existence of the Ontario education department as a political institution is accomplished. In the current number of the Bookseller and Stationer there are a fev statements of interest to the general public. 

A SCENE IN "A LION'S HEART" AT THE GRAND TO-NIGHT.


ENGLISH KINGS FOR ENGLAND: Exchange.
