THE LOCAL BUDGET

Judge Woods today gave his decision

Court. The jury gave a verdict for

and Division Court costs for Gardner,

to rule 1132. This means that Mr.

County Court above what he would
have incurred had the action been

PASSED AWAY

Sister Claire Enters the Unseen
at an Early Hour this
Morning.

After a serious illness, extending
over about three weeks, Sister Claire,
Mother Superior at St. Joseph's Hos-
pital, passed peacefully away at four
o'clock this morning.

Her illness first started with a chill,
which was not considered serious, but
she had been sick for about nine days
when she was taken down with what
was thought to be la grippe. Her
condition became serious two weeks
ago last Sunday, and from then up
till the time of her death she suf-
fered intensely. Her illness finally re-
sulted in pneumonia, and after being
taken with this disease she only lived
for three days.

Everything which human skill and
power could do was done to save her
life and she was waited upon by every
physician in the city. None of them,
however, held out any hope for her
recovery.

During her short illness, although
she suffered intensely, she was boun-
ce up by Christian patience and forti-
tude, and when she realized that she
could not recover, she was fully re-
signed to the will of her Master.

Deceased was 42 years of age and
came here about a year and a half
ago to take over the charge of St.
Joseph's Hospital. During the time
she was here she gave evidence of her
great ability as a hospital matron
in that the work of the hospital was
never so successful as it was under
her management. She was deeply be-
loved by everyone with whom she
came in contact in the performance
of her professional duties, and her
death will be a great loss to the
doctors of the city, by whom she was
greatly respected and trusted im-
plicitly. She was born in Tillson-
burg, and previous to her coming here
she was matron of the St. Joseph's
Hospital, London, where her services
were also deeply appreciated.

Her parents are both dead, her fa-
ther having been buried a week ago
to-day. She leaves three brothers to
mourn her loss. They are Judge
Mugan, of Port Stanley, Mich.; M.
D. Mugan, superintendent of the
Public Schools of Missouri, and Rev. J.
G. Mugan, parish pastor of the Bal-
lough church, who is at present seri-
ously ill in St. Joseph's Hospital.

The remains were escorted to the
station by a large cortege of friends,
and were sent at 3.30 to London.
The funeral will take place in Lon-
don to-morrow. Solemn service will
be conducted in the Hope Chapel by
Bishop McEvey, to-morrow morning.
