Church in Quebec and Valuable Paintings Burned.

Paintings Burned.

Quesso, Jan. 1.—About three o'clock this morning a fire broke out in the Quebec Seminary Chapel which totally destroyed the edifice and about \$500,000 worth of original oil paintings. When the firemen arrived the flarges were still confined to the cellar where the fire originated, but the smoke was so dense that all approach was out off. About a minute after the arrival of the brigade the fire gained the ground floor on the interior of the chapel and, fed by the old and dry wooden fixtures of the place, gained such headway that all hope of saving the building was abandoned. The flames quickly spread to the northeasterly portion of the dormitory, which is uncounied, adjoining the chapel, but the firemen checked its progress there and consequently saved the whole of that immense block surrounding the Seminary yard. Only the bare walls of the chapel remain and these are so badly shaken that they will have to be demolished.

The edifice was built in 1735, shortly after the founding of Laval University, and was probably one of the most ancient buildings in Canada. It contained five alters some two centuries old.

There is an insurance of \$14,000 on the ohapel and \$16,000 on the paintings, which are a total loss. The dormitory is damaged to the extent of \$1,000, fully covered by insurance.

#### Burglary at Blenheim.

BLENHEIM, Jan. 2.—Some time after one o'clock this morning burglars oracked Edward Olding's safe, completely wreeking the safe and smashing all the front windows in the shop. They got \$65 in cash and a large quantity of notes. They then ransacked the station, but did not get anything there,

It appears that he had been annoyed by a strange dog worrying his cettle in the barnyard and he took down a rife from the wall which had been loaded for some time, and on firing it off the rifls burst, the barrel, a heavy steel octagon one, bursting at the breech and at the muzzle as if it had been common metal, at the same time shattering Mr. English's left hand in such away that an amputation had to be performed at the wrist, which was successfully done by Drs. It is almost certain, however, that the work cannot be prosecuted until early spring. Dr. Bryce roughly estimated the basis of the zeturns made by one medical man that there have been 1,000 cases of fever in the city since the beginning of September. The physician in question had had 110 cases under his obarge in that time. Dr. Bryce was particularly severe on the neglect of many physicians to report cases of contagious disease coming under their observation.
