Moved by Coun. Tracey, seconded Coun. Carvell, "That the report of the Finance Committee be adopted and \$13,000.00 be assessed upon the County for County Purposes for year 1918 and that one-half the debit balances be assessed upon the several parishes as these accounts are on books of Secy-Treas. in addition to their proportion of the \$13,000.00 assessed for county purposes."

Moved by Coun. Keith, seconded by Coun. Tracey, that the Finance Committee and Secy-Treas. be authorized to arrange for an overdraft at the Bank of \$20,000 in addition to the \$5,000 authorized by Act of Assembly for the purpose of paying the expenses of the County and the grant to the Patriotic Fund as same as required.

Moved by Coun. Carvell, seconded by Coun. Bell (Wakefield) that revisors' fee for 1918 be the same as 1917.

The following letter and petition from the Dept. of Agriculture was read by the Warden.

Coun. Smith said the question of destruction of sheep by dogs were getting very serious. He advocated a stiff tax on dogs.

Coun. Perry (Simonds) said the destruction of valuable sheep was getting to a stage where something must be done.

On motion the matter was left over till tomorrow morning.

A motion to adjourn till tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock was lost.

Coun. Perry (Kent) Matters concerning the care of the poor in Kent are becoming very serious. People are prosperous and it costs now \$7 a week when formerly it cost \$2. He quoted extensively from scripture in support of his contention for a poor farm for the county. He moved that a committee of three be appointed to look into the working of poor farms in Kings and other counties and report at June session.

Seconded by Coun. Kinney and carried.

Couns. Perry (Kent), Phillips and Keith were appointed such committee.

Adjourned till 10 o'clock tomorrow.

The Council met at 10 o'clock.

The Secy-Treas. announced that a charge made in the auditor's report, leaves Wilnot county owing \$216.57. The report as corrected was accepted.

The Warden spoke of the donation made last year by ex-Warden Tracey, supplemented by the members of the Council, to establish a bed in Fisher Hospital and he felt that we might do the same to be given what a proposed extension to the hospital was completed. The suggestion met with the approval of the members.

The committee on seed wheat submitted the following report through Coun. Perry (Simonds) who moved:

Resolved that this County Council of Carleton endorse, and commit itself to a campaign for greater production of foodstuffs especially of wheat in this county for the year 1918.

Further resolved that the Councilors of their respective parishes, be a committee to assist in this campaign in their own locality.

Further resolved that this Council co-operates with the Dept. of Agriculture in the distribution and financing of seed grain to the farmers on a cash basis.

Finally resolved that a committee of councillors Tracey, Keith and Benn be appointed to work out the details with the Department of Agriculture, to direct the campaign of greater production in the county.

Coun. Lamont was not willing to have this council finance the seed grain, if this was the meaning of the resolution.

Coun. Melville—It would appear that the Agricultural Dept. in Fredericton, wanted the council to finance the said scheme.

This is the impression I got at a meeting in Fredericton. I don't feel that the members of the Agricultural Dept. should be relieved of their duties. It was the intention that if this council finances the scheme they collect the money from the sale of the seed.

Coun. Lamont felt that seed wheat should be brought from farmers who will guarantee it true to type.

Coun. Keith—Our firm has handled seed wheat for years and there is no comparison of seed from the seed houses and the farmers.

Coun. Watson—The committee was assured by Dr. Kierstead that all we would be called upon to do was to distribute the wheat and collect the money.

Coun. Anderson—If wheat is sent into a parish who takes charge of it.

Coun. Phillips—Some farmers raise good wheat and the millers know who they are. I admit some farmers mix their wheat.

Coun. Watson—Dr. Kierstead instructed a miller in my presence to only buy the best wheat.

Coun. Lamont—If you buy from a reliable seed house you will take no chances.

Coun. Tompkins—I am also in favor of buying from seed houses.

Coun. Derrah—The wheat we get comes from the government.

Coun. Perry (Simonds)—We are only asked to take care of government wheat when sent in and collect the money. It is sold on a cash basis.

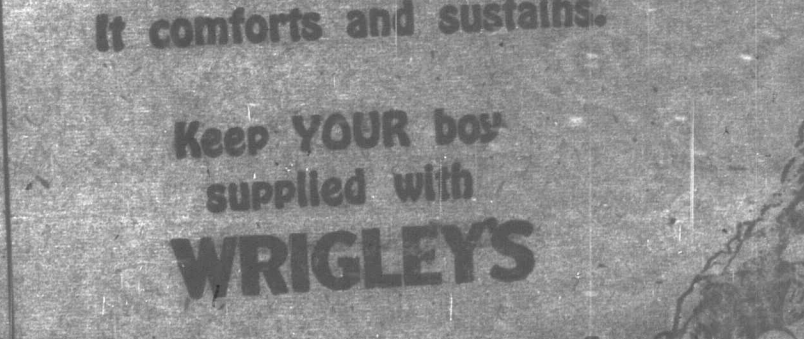
