REV. A. A. RIDEOUT TAKES NEW CHARGE

The following from a Massachusetts paper will be read with interest by the Carleton county friends of a former Hartland boy:

Rev. A. A. Rideout, retiring pastor of the Blaney Memorial Baptist Church, Lower Mills, and Mrs. Rideout were tendered a farewell reception Thursday evening and, as a parting gift of the several hundred members of the congregation and friends in attendance, Mr. Rideout was presented with a purse of \$150 in gold. Mr. Rideout, who has resigned to become pastor of the First Baptist Church in Waltham, will, on Sunday, terminate his pastorate of eleven years, the longest in the history of the church, speaking in the morning of "Memories and Appreciations," and in the evening on "The Parting of the Ways."

At the reception Thursday, Rev. and Mrs. Rideout were assisted by the deacons and deaconesses, and by Rev. J. C. Wingett of the First M. E. Church, and Rev. Watson Wordsworth of the Village Congregational Church. Exercises which followed in the main auditorium were opened with prayer by Rev. Mr. Shipman, former pastor of the church. Addresses were made by Noble Grant Duhy of Dorchester Lodge of Odd Fellows, Rev. Watson Wordsworth, Frederic A. Gaskins, master of Macedonian Lodge of Masons, Rev. J. C. Wingett, Rev. Lyman R. Swett, another former pastor of Blaney Memorial church, and John Taylor of Huntington F. Wolcott Post, G. A. R. of Milton, of which Mr. Rideout is an associate member. Mr. Taylor, on behalf of the members of the post, presented in uniform, presented to Mr. Rideout a large silver loving cup suitably engraved from the Civil War veterans as a token of love and esteem.

The presentation of the congregational gift was made by Otis J. Redden, chairman of the reception committee, who at the same time presented to Mrs. Rideout a beautiful bouquet of pink roses. The program also included solos by Mrs. Rowlock and by Ben H. Redden. Members of the reception committee, in addition to Chairman Redden, included Mrs. Haskell, L. W. Kent, W. J. Tower, Mrs. Vernon Vore, Miss Annie Stoddard, George F. Savage, Mrs. O. J. Redden, Mr. and Mrs. J. E. Beless Edward Murphy.

Mr. Rideout began his pastorate at Blaney Memorial Baptist Church on September 18, 1910, coming from Fredericton, N. B. During the first two years he carried on studies at the Newton Theological Institution and was graduated in 1912. He also took some postgraduate work at the Boston University.

The church membership has been more than doubled and now is over 400. The missionary benevolences have greatly increased, and a steady upward growth along all lines has marked Mr. Rideout's effort. The church property has been improved and is in fine condition. The mortgage on the parsonage was burned five years ago, a garage was recently built, and a fund of about \$7000 accumulated for enlarging the church.

During the war Mr. Rideout was invited by the U. S. Shipping Board to speak at factories and shipyards, where Government work was being done. During his period of such service he addressed more than 100,000 workers. He was also a speaker for the Red Cross and Liberty Loans, and during the Victory Loan toured Connecticut on the War Relic train.

Mr. Rideout is well known in fraternal circles. He is chaplain of Macedonian Lodge of Masons and prelate of Joseph Warren Commandery. Among the Odd Fellows he is Past Grand of Dorchester Lodge and Deputy Grand Master of the Grand Lodge. He is a Past Chancellor of Milton Lodge, Knights of Pythias. Mr. Rideout has a large number of friends in Dorchester and Milton who wish him the best success in his new field.


On Tuesday evening a large number of the boys and girls of the Dorchester Lower Mills gave Master Theodore Rideout a surprise at the parsonage on Richmond street. Agnes Drever, on behalf of the school friends, presented Theodore with a golden token of their friendship and good wishes.


