SHIPPING.—Brig's Herbert Robinson, from Sackville arrived at Barbados on Nov. 1st.

LAMBS.—P. G. Mahoney, Esq., of Botsford is shipping lambs from Antigonish to Portland Me. He has shipped over 5,000 this season already.

HORSEWHIPPED.—The other day Hon. J. W. White of Centerville, publicly horsewhipped Rev. Samuel Howard, Methodist minister of that place for an offence not named. An action has been entered against Mr. White, Mr. Howard graduated from Mt. Allison in 1889.

NAVAL.—Mr. John Fawcett, Esq., Upper Sackville, raised this fall 2½ blood-turkey, each measuring 2 ft. 3½ inches. The combined weight of the two birds was 17 lbs. Who can beat this!

RAIL BRIDGE.—A small bridge on station road near Gill's corner is in a condition very dangerous to the lives and limbs of horses. One of the planks or poles has rotted out and a hole large enough to allow a leg to go through, is right in the track of the horses. At night it is practically impossible to see it.

J. W. Hunter, timber contractor, of Cumberland, N. S., has just closed his contracts with the Springhill mill for eleven years. Mr. Hunter has been engaged in getting out booms and props for the mines. Last year he delivered 120,000 pieces, 90 carloads have been got out in one month. Sixty men and twenty horses are employed.

Arrangements have been made in Moncton to commence classes in the University extension course. Prof. Andrews of Sackville will be one of the lecturers.

Frank Beckwith, son of John Beckwith, of Harvey, Albert Co., fell from a wharf in St. John, Friday morning and was drowned. He was 19 years of age and a sailor.

The school commissioners of Cumberland have decided to erect a large academy containing twelve departments and all other necessary rooms, and to be of stone and brick.

One of the 100 ton engines built by the Kingston locomotive works for the Chignecto ship railway was completed last week, another will be finished this week, but the remaining two will not be ready until spring.

Mention has previously been made in THE POST of the discovery of gold in the old ballast pit at Memramcook. An American syndicate has taken hold of it and a 50 stamp mill will be put up at once.—Sun.

—During the past season eight crabs, 100 feet in length and about 175 feet deep each have been sunk and 900 feet of superstructure built. The work is entirely finished now out to 2900 feet from the shore; 1200 of stone work and 1600 of crib. One of the two angles at the end of the pier has been completed and the second angle has been finished with the exception of three crabs which will be the last of the foundation work. A crane will be put on the angles so that cars can run out the entire length. Work will be commenced in the spring as soon as the ice goes. Next summer the work will be finished.
