BIG LEAGUERS DON'T WANT HIM

Managers Say He Drinks Too Much Booze and Makes Trouble.

(Providence, R. I., Bulletin.) Word comes from Cincinnati that Larry McLean, the comedian catcher of the Cincinnati Reds, is slated for the minor leagues. The Cubs have waived on this celebrated backstop and nothing now prevents Garry Hermann from turning him back to obscure pastures. It is charged that McLean has been largely responsible for the disorganization of the Rhinelanders this season.

Fredericton friends of Big Larry, who was born here and played here with the old Tartars, will regret to hear of the trouble he is getting himself into and the unenviable reputation he has earned.

His case should prove a striking lesson to young men with aspirations to become professional baseball players. McLean is one of the best natural catchers in the big leagues today, a fine backstop, an accurate thrower and a consistent hitter; but he has bad habits and that causes his value to a club to deteriorate so materially that even phenomenal ability won't pay for it.

HALIFAX TROTTER'S ILLNESS IS FATAL

Anitra, Owned by R. H. Edwards, Died at Race Track of Acute Indigestion

The Halifax Recorder says:—"The four year old mare Anitra, owned by R. H. Edwards, which was taken ill Thursday with acute indigestion, died Saturday evening. Anitra, which was entered in the 2:40 trot at the exhibition races, was second in the three year old stake last year. She was richly bred, being by Achilles, 2:15½, dam Lassie, (the dam of Stimmassie, 2:08½), and she is not only a loss to her owner, but to the breeding interests."

A FAST COLT.

The New Glasgow Chronicle says:—"Achilles the Great" (2) 2:30, now 3 years, is said by experts to be the fastest trotter ever seen in Halifax. A visitor to Halifax last week reports that he saw him trot a mile in 2:26, the last half in 1:08, as easy as many horses can trot a half in 1:15. Had Gers had him since he was a year old he would probably be another Harvester. Mr. Musgrave has a yearling, out of the same mare, sired by Baring, 2:19½, that he has entered in the 2 year old stake, and which is said to have trotted a mile in 2:48 and halves in 1:20. This daughter of Krenlin and Ella Nutwood is evidently a great brood mare."

The experiment of having a half mile track in the Grand circuit is not worth repeating.—Boston Globe.
