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FATAL SHOOTING AT CHARLOTTE- TOWN

Accidental Discharge of a
Gun Kills Boy of 16
Years

LIVED ONLY FEW HOURS

Was Visiting in Prince Edward
Island for Benefit of His
Health

CHARLOTTETOWN, Wednesday.—On Monday evening a fatal shooting accident occurred at Alexandria, ten miles from Charlottetown, the victim being John Winslow, aged 16. He and his cousin, Arthur Wood, aged 18, were running. The latter saw a hawk and rushed for the gun. On coming out of the building the weapon was accidentally discharged and the load of small shot struck Winslow who was a few yards away, in the abdomen. He died a few hours later. Winslow belonged to Boston and was visiting the island for his health.

LEGISLATURE OPENS TO-DAY

Most Brilliant Ceremony in Years Will
Mark Opening of New House at
Fredericton

GRAND MILITARY DISPLAY

(Special to the Morning Graphic.)

FREDERICTON, Wednesday.—The legislature will be opened tomorrow afternoon by Lieutenant-Governor Tweedie with exceptional pomp and ceremony. Members of the Woodstock Field Battery will likely arrive this evening in charge of Major Good and will fire the customary salute. The guard of honor from the 1st Regiment will be commanded by Capt. Guthrie and the subaltern will be Lieutenants Bingham and Roberts. Lieutenant T. M. Wright acting as adjutant.
The number of visitors from outside points who will be here for the opening this year will likely exceed all former records and if the weather is fine so that the military display can be held in its entirety, the ceremony promises to be a grand one.
The governor will arrive at the legislature at about 2:40 o'clock when the guard of honor will meet him with the presented arms, and while the salute is fired from cannons which will be placed on the bank of the river, the gubernatorial party will repair to the Assembly chamber for the opening of the legislature.
The gathering at the Assembly chamber promises to be one of brilliancy. In all about three hundred invitations have been issued to those asked to take seats upon the floor of the House. In the evening there will be the usual state dinner by the Lieutenant-Governor. In the Assembly chamber at noon tomorrow the members of the new legislature will be sworn in, the oath being administered before Chief Justice Barker. As yet but few members have arrived in the city. Mr. Byrne and Dr. Sornman of Gloucester arrived last evening and are at the Queen accompanied by their wives. Dr. Bourque, of Kent and Mr. Sproul of Kings are also here and are guests at the Barrington house.

SPAIN'S BANDIT HERO MAY RECEIVE FULL PARDON

MADRID, Monday.—It is currently reported that simultaneously with the appearance of the book which is now writing in prison on Banditism in Spain, Villito, the greatest bandit of them all, will get a free pardon. Such an act on the government's part would be widely popular, for the name of Villito to Spain is that of Robin Hood was to old England.
Villito is supposed to be one of those noble outlaws who rob the rich only, and shower benefits on the poor. It was something very similar to regret that characterized reports of his arrest last December. This took place in the Argentine Republic after he had been sought in vain by the police for many years. Picturesque outlawry has always existed more or less in Andalusia. And of all the outlaws in Southern Spain none was more picturesque than he.
The real name of Villito is Joaquin Camargo. He was born near Seville 36 years ago. Although he was the offspring of respectable parents, he began his adventurous career of crime while still a youth, and soon made a name for himself. One of his most famous exploits had as its scene a much-travelled road near Setenil, where five years ago he held up 25 merchants, one after another, as they returned from a fair. The whole 25 were taken prisoner and bound and gagged, lying side by side. Villito's work had netted him 50,000 pesetas. Although he performed some of his

Negotiations have been in progress for many months, and in the meantime popular feeling in favor of the outlaw has been on the increase in Argentina as well as in Spain.
The Spanish government has been asked to recall its order of extradition, and to send out a pardon instead. There is growing likelihood that it will do so.

It is stated that the notes of the bank are secured under the banking act, according to latest official return the bank had a surplus of \$353,000 over its liabilities. It is certain that there will be a balance for the shareholders.
