BALMORAL NOTES
 The solemn tolling of our Church bell Friday morning, the 30th inst conveyed to the parish of Balmoral the sad news of the demise of one of our oldest settlers. Mr Isaac Arsenau at the age of 75. After a long illness, endured in a spirit of true fortitude and Christian resignation to the will of the Father, Mr Arsenau strengthened for the long journey by the rites of Holy Mother Church gave up his soul into the hands of his Creator. His was a life well spent in good deeds and in the service of his fellow men. His children are Daniel Arsenau, the Warden of the country, James, John, Vincent, Stanley, Thomas, Laus and Sarah, who were at his bedside when he died. His funeral took place Sunday afternoon. The long cortege of mourners evinced the high esteem the deceased was held by the parishioners of Balmoral.

RIHLUNG FORT CAPTURED
Japs Capture 4 Heavy Guns, 7 Rapid Firing Guns, and 32 Others.
 Headquarters of Japanese Army before Port Arthur, via Fusan, Dec 30—Rihlung Fort, captured yesterday, is the largest and strongest fort on the eastern ridge. Tunnels for mines were cut out of the solid rock, and two tons of dynamite was used to blow up the walls. The spectacle was magnificent and the work of the assaulters was splendid. Half the garrison was killed by the explosion and the first charge. The remainder of the Russians made a stubborn resistance. Four heavy guns, seven rapid fire guns and two machine guns were captured as well as thirty quick firing guns, which were stored in the fort.

TOGO WELCOMED
The Admiral received Royally at Tokio
CALLS UPON EMPEROR
 Tokio, Dec 30—The headquarters of the army besieging Port Arthur telegraphs that on the night of Dec 28, after the occupation of Rihlung fort, a small body of Russians still offered resistance in the passage between the siege gun line and the gorge. At three o'clock in the morning they were dislodged entirely and the occupation of the fort became assured. According to the statement of three prisoners the defenders of Port Rihlung numbered about 500, besides some sailors. A majority of the defenders were killed. The trophies captured with Fort Rihlung include four large calibre guns, thirty-seven millimetre guns, two machine guns and much property as yet unenumerated.
 Headquarters of the Japanese army before Port Arthur, via Fusan, Dec 30—The Rihlung fort captured yesterday is the largest and strongest of the Eastern Fort ridge. Tunnels for mines were cut through solid rock and four tons of dynamite laid to blow up the walls. The spectacle was magnificent and the work of the assaulters was splendid. Half the garrison was killed by the explosion of the first mine. The remainder of the Russians made a stubborn resistance. Four heavy guns, seven rapid firing guns and two machine guns were captured, as well as thirty quick firing guns and two machine guns which were stored in the fort.
 Tokio, Dec 30—Admiral Togo and Vice Admiral Kamimura with their staffs arrived at the Shimabashi station at 9.30 o'clock to-day. Their journey from Kube to Tokio was a continuous ovation. At an early hour to-day the streets were filled and the city gaily decorated with flags, lanterns and New Year's decorations. Representatives of the Emperor and Empress, Prince Fushimi, jr., elder statesmen, ministers, prominent Japanese and thousands of school children greeted the arrival of the naval hero at the station. The presidents of both houses of the Diet presented them with the resolution of commendation passed by their respective branches of parliament.
 The quiet graybearded Admiral Togo, in a blue service uniform, seemed embarrassed at the noisy ovation. Rear Admiral Shimura chief of staff, laughingly chatted with Vice Admiral Kamimura. The junior officers tried to clear the way but the crowd closed in on Admiral Togo, and they were frequently forced to push the crowd backward in an endeavor to clear the reaching hands. Finally Admiral Togo and Vice Admiral Kamimura were freed from their enthusiastic admirers and surrounded by officers they reached the carriage sent by the emperor to the station to convey the distinguished party to the palace. As Admiral Togo appeared a great

show of enthusiasm was thrown in the air, and "Banzai" was shouted by the party drove under triumphant arches, waving flags and discharging fire works, though the cheering crowds to the navy department, during which the congratulations of the ministers were received and future victors were toasted.
 Admiral Togo and Vice Admiral Kamimura then proceeded to the palace to report to the Emperor. They will probably remain in Tokio about the week, for the purpose of consulting with the general staff and perfecting plans for future operations.

SAW YOUNG DIE
A Southern Man Whose Evidence Should Prove Nan Patterson's Innocence
 New York, Dec 30—Another man who claims to have witnessed the tragic death of Caesar Young, the wealthy bookmaker with whose murder Nan Patterson is charged, has been found in Jacksonville, Fla according to information received in this city today. The alleged witness is W. B. Meyers, who is said to be a wealthy native stores dealer in that city. According to the story which came here to-day, in a letter from Judge H. D. Twigg of Savannah, Ga., to the counsel for the prisoner, Meyers claims to have seen the tragedy in the cab and declares that Young fired the shot which ended his life.
 Judge Twigg writes that Meyers came to him for consultation in a legal matter soon after the Young tragedy, and casually mentioned that while in New York a few days before he had witnessed a most remarkable affair, and in reply to questions, Judge Twigg writes, Meyers said that he had seen a man shoot himself in a cab, giving at the same time the location of the spot where the Patterson-Young affair took place.
 He said that he had learned that the man's name was Young, but beyond that he knew nothing. When informed that Nan Patterson had been arrested, charged with the murder of Young, Judge Twigg says Meyers declared that he knew the girl to be innocent and said that he would send her his name and would go to New York to testify if she were put on trial. Continuing, Judge Twigg says, that he followed the proceedings in the Patterson trial carefully, watching eagerly for the testimony of Meyers and was greatly surprised when he did not appear

Finally, concluding that Meyers had not written to the girl or her counsel, he decided to do so himself and forwarded the letter.
