POLICE COURT NEWS

Richard Breaux of Tabusintac was before Police Magistrate J. R. Lawlor yesterday, charged with stealing and having in his possession stolen goods, known to be such. It appears from the evidence adduced, that a Mr. Wheeler of Massachusetts, who has been coming to Tabusintac, for some time, and who has erected a Cottage there left Mr. McEachren of Tabusintac in charge of his cottage last fall when he left. Mr. Wheeler intended coming here again this summer and on information from Mr. McEachren, that his cottage had been broken into, came here at once and found a number of articles missing valued at about one hundred dollars, as well as many articles being destroyed. Suspicion was laid on Richard Breaux of Tabusintac and Mr. Wheeler secured a search warrant from James W. Robertson, J. P., of Tabusintac and in searching Richard Breaux's home they found a number of the stolen articles in his house while Mr. Breaux himself was wearing Mr. Wheeler's shirt and moccasins. Richard Breaux was arrested and tried before Police Magistrate Lawlor yesterday. His Honor gave the accused a two year suspended sentence for future good conduct and also 3 months in the County Jail for the offence. Last Saturday, Chief of Police Ashford received a letter from Dalhousie requesting him to look into the matter of a Mr. Smith from that place who had left Dalhousie, supposed to be bound for Newcastle, with a woman other than his wife. The Chief of Police investigated the Miramichi Hotel register and found that Mr. Smith and wife were registered there. A warrant for vagrancy was issued by Police Magistrate J. R. Lawlor and Mr. Smith was arrested. The case was settled and the young lady was sent home.
