Blake Bros., of this city, sent one handsome carriage horse, one pair of three-year-old steers weighing 2,617 lbs., one four-year-old ox weighing 1,685 lbs., two heifers and one fat cow weighing about 3,000 lbs. There are also threshing machines, fanning mills, and a large quantity of grain and roots. Our island exhibit is very creditable, and is in charge of Messrs. Henry Langworth, P. Blake, C. G. Gardiner, and Charles Hazard.

Tenders must be made for not less than \$1,000, and in multiples of \$1,000. The allotment of the loan will be made as soon as possible after the close of the subscription list, the amounts allotted will be payable on the 1st day of November next, and Bonds will be issued shortly after that date.
