

The provisions of the new Act which is now in force, are as follows: Reduction of the time public houses may remain open, which is now from a.m. to 9 p.m.; abolition of credit system for liquor consumed on the premises; penalizing the sale of intoxicants on the cash delivery system in Local Option Districts. A further section dealing with future licenses as to the arrangement of bar-room and the closing of all back and side entrances will apply to all new licensed premises.


