NEW YORK, Dec. 6.

LONDON, Dec. 6.
The Times, warmly welcoming Premier Borden's proposal, heartily approves the appointment of a Canadian Minister as a member of the Imperial Defence Committee. Similar appointments by other Dominions will be equally welcomed, for they mean more than the creation of navies or contributions.

LONDON, Dec. 6.
Eighty-two fishermen lost their lives during the recent storm on the Portuguese coast four days ago. A fleet of a hundred fishing vessels whose crews totalled 182 men were caught in a gale. Up to the present only 100 have returned, and it is almost certain that the remainder went down with their craft. The survivors suffered severe privations. They were without food or water for three days, while seas and heavy cold winds prevailed. Four fishermen became insane, jumped overboard and were drowned. Six bodies were washed ashore on the northern coast.

LONDON, Dec. 6.
There was a remarkable development yesterday in the investigations into the robbery of ten thousand sovereigns contained in two cases in a consignment of £200,000, shipped by the Bank of England to the Credit Lyonnais at Alexandria, Egypt, about three weeks ago. The two cases were found on arrival at Alexandria, to contain lead instead of gold, and were sent back to England for expert examination. Extra precautions were taken to guard these two cases on the return journey, but they have either been lost or stolen, and no trace of them can be discovered. The continental police believe that they were intercepted by the same gang which carried out the original robbery.

LONDON, Dec. 6.
Pending the assembling of the peace delegates at London, the Balkan allies are occupied preparing a joint draft of their demands, which will be made upon Turkey. It is understood they are exchanging communications with a view to arriving at an agreement defining their own mutual obligations. The formal acceptance of all the Powers to send delegates to the Ambassadors conference to be held in London, has not yet been received, but there is no reason to suppose it will be delayed in assembling. The position of Greece in refusing to sign the armistice remains unchanged. The Greeks are said to be continuing the campaign on the islands.



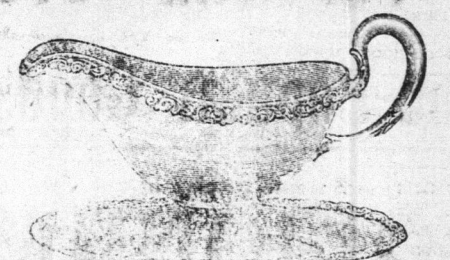

MONTREAL, Dec. 6.
A special despatch from London to the "Star" says the Borden policy strikes the naval authorities as a master stroke, giving evidence of careful study and keen discrimination between the useful and the useless, with a proper regard for Canadian autonomy, and a very natural regard for Canadian national pride. It provides at once a stroke of great augmentation to the power of organization of the Imperial defence, and naval authorities from the highest to the lowest unite in saying Canada's new policy has the right ring about it—a ring of earnestness. At last Canada has risen to an appreciation of her own danger, and responsibility. Even looked upon solely from the point of Canada's own interests as selfishly as one likes, the new naval policy is regarded here as a great stride. The right of recall harmonizes with Canada's desire for liberty of action. Placing a fighting line of ships that can give an account of themselves, shows that Canada is not going to take a back place or content herself with being an adjunct of even the Mother Country.
