

WILLIAM COWPER born 1731. An English poet imbued with much piety of sentiment and a remarkable poetic talent. His "Task" is one of the great poems of the 18th century. He received a pension of £200 a year from George III.  
MARSHAL SOULT died 1850, aged 81. One of Napoleon's favourite and most capable generals, distinguishing himself in many campaigns. After Waterloo he went into exile but was allowed to return to France in 1819.  
THANKSGIVING DAY U.S.A.  
"THE WRECK OF THE 'WHITE SHIP' 1120. Henry I. had one son William, on whom his hopes were placed for the succession to the throne. In the wreck, William was drowned off the coast of Normandy. The blow was a severe one to Henry and the poetess Mrs. Hemans, has kept the incident of the "White Ship" green in our memory.  
QUEEN MAUD OF NORWAY, born 1869. The daughter of Edward VII.

## Emden's Rudder and Funnels Soon Fell.

London, Nov. 18.—A despatch from Melbourne, Australia, to Reuter's Telegram Company contains part of the report which Capt. John Glossop, of the Australian cruiser Sydney, made regarding the fight in which the German cruiser Emden was destroyed. It says:—  
"The Emden's firing soon failed, when the Sydney began to hit the mark. The Emden's rudder was destroyed early in the fight, her speed suffering greatly in consequence.  
"Her next loss was the No. 1 funnel, then the foremost, and this was followed by the No. 2 funnel. Finally the No. 3 funnel fell."

## Doctors and Gas Fires

In an article which recently appeared in the London "Evening News," Mr. W. G. Faulkner stated: "In making my inquiries I discovered one significant fact. This was that one company—the Gas Light and Coke Company—had among their consumers 2,500 doctors who had gas fires installed in their houses, some as many as ten or a dozen; that 1,500 of these doctors had become users of gas during the past three years; and that not one had ever given them up."  
Professor C. V. Boys, F.R.S., says, in the "Standard": "Sentiment and inertia are the only obstacles against the general adoption of gas fires and cooking appliances. Wonderful strides have been made, in spite of deep-rooted prejudice. A gas fire, burning with a blue, is an admirable agent for heating a room; and, as a scientist, I fail to understand how such a gas fire dries the air in a room more than any other fire."—nov17,14

The s.s. Sagona arrived from Labrador yesterday. All our citizens were pleased to see the boat back, as many were beginning to think that some mishap had befallen her, owing to the long passage.

Mrs. W. Gosse, of the West End, who had not heard from her son William for some time, was delighted to get a letter from him yesterday, informing her that he was with the Canadian troops at Salisbury Plains. Another of our Harbor Grace boys who has answered the call to go forward and battle for the Motherland.

A great commotion was caused in town last evening, when it became known that a little girl four years old, daughter of Mr. E. Sheppard, Noad Street, was missing, as it was known to some children that she had been taken off by a man who had enticed the little one with two cents. A search was commenced, police and civilians—all searching every likely place. At last, about 7 o'clock, the little one and the man was found in an old barn near Shannon Park. The man, whose name is William Bransfield, was immediately placed under arrest. This is all we can say at present.

A good supply of beef is on sale in the places at present, and the price is from 12 to 14 cts. per pound. People find it hard to sell even at that price.

We have been asked to draw attention of the proper authorities to the great danger of leaving the public thoroughfares which have lately been torn up by the torrents of water from the hill, without lights at night, to the danger of the people living on the hill who have to go that way. Death Hill, Long Hill and Stretton's Hill are the places complained of.

A man in town, who has the great interest of the unemployed at heart, is working up, or trying to work up a plan, whereby some ten or twelve families will be able to live comfortably through the approaching apparently trying winter. The idea is to secure the most needy, providing they are industrious. His plan will be not to make money, but to give employment and let the work done pay for the outlay. Thoughtful, very. ## Household Notes

To make a candle burn low, put salt around the wick under the flame. It will give a soft, steady light and will burn all night.  
Excellent griddle cakes can be made with a small quantity of boiled rice left over. Such rice is always good for croquettes.

Sun your mattresses as often as you can. Put them out on the porch roof in the hot sun. This will keep them fresh and clean.  
Lower the temperature of an oven considerably after the roast has been in twenty minutes and the juices will be retained.

If celery is allowed to lie in water for six or eight hours before it is put on the table it will be very tender.  
To keep a broom in good order, soak it about in the hot suds on wash day, then shape it carefully and stand it on its handle to dry.

Put a little kerosene in the laundry starch when it is cooking. It will make ironing easier.  
Corn beef makes a pleasant change and it is economical. Plan to have it cooked when the laundry fire is hot, serve hot for dinner, then sliced cold with baked beans, and the fatty parts and the undesirable ends will grind up and make an excellent corn beef hash for breakfast.

A cheap cut of meat well prepared is better than a poor one badly prepared.  
A piece of flank meat can be stuffed with cracker crumbs, chopped pork, an egg, savory herbs, and seasoning, then rolled tight in a cloth and boiled four hours. Cool and press before cutting.

If possible sun the mattresses once a week in the open air.  
Chemically prepared dusters are the best.

All cleaning cloths, such as dish-cloths, require frequent boiling.  
Fruits ought to be thoroughly washed before serving.  
Garbage—if one lives in the country—should be either burned or buried.

Government bulletins which deal with household sanitation may be had upon application to one's Representative in Congress.  
Serge and Scotch flannel used for children's school dresses have the great advantage of being washable.

Use a wooden potato masher for creaming butter.  
Brick ice cream may be cut in fancy shapes by means of a cookie cutter dipped in hot water.

Always stick flowers into a vase one by one.  
A coat of gum copal will make shoes waterproof.
