CHAPPED HANDS AND LIPS.

What is more unattractive than cracked, bleeding lips or red, rough hands. And as they are both so unattractive, painful and wholly unnecessary we cannot help wonder why folks have them.

As a rule chapped and cracked lips are the result of neglect and carelessness. A few moments spent before retiring each night, rubbing them with some soft cream will keep them soft and natural in shape and color even in the coldest weather.

Chapped lips seem to be a chronic disorder. One scale of cuticle peeling off to be replaced by another dry, hard piece, the victim of the disorder becomes accustomed to it and ceases to notice it. Cracks upon the lips are deep and sore, bleeding slightly nearly every day. Cracks upon the hands seem to appear without any apparent cause, a fissure opening in the skin crosswise of the muscles length, the fissure seeming to gape open, remaining this way for some time after closing, leaving a rough red, painful ridge.

The cause of such troubles is not far to seek when it is seen that chapped and cracked lips nearly always manifest themselves after a period of intense cold when care has not been taken to keep the lips dry while out of doors. Moisture gathering upon a veil, a careless habit of touching the lips with the tongue will almost immediately produce chapped lips.

For both hands and lips an old-fashioned remedy liked very much by our grandmothers was nothing more or less than mutton suet. A small piece produced from the butchers, cut fine, melted up and slowly poured into a tiny cup. When it hardened the cake was taken from the cup and kept in a convenient jar upon the dresser.

War News.

Messages Received Previous to 9 A.M.

OFFICIAL.

LONDON, March 6. The Governor, Newfoundland:

The Admiralty announces the following: Further reports received on operations March 3rd and onwards. No action was possible on the 3rd till the afternoon when the irresistible, Albion, Prince George and Triumph resumed the attack on Fort Dardanelles, and the concealed guns in the neighborhood. These were less active than before, and the ships fired with more certainty. Seaplanes located encampments and batteries.

On March 4th the weather became fine, and sweeping and bombardment operations continued. Demolition parties and covering detachments were landed at Kum Kaleh and Seddul Bahr. Later the party destroyed four Nordenfeldts and found the enemy holding the villages in force. On the same day the Sapphire silenced a battery at Dikill in the Gulf of Adramyti, and the Prince George shelled the defences of Besika. Casualties on the 4th were 19 killed, 3 missing and 25 wounded.

On March 5th the Queen Elizabeth attacked the defences at the Narrows, supported by the Inflexible and Prince George. Fire was confined to forts Rumlh, Medjidih, Tabia, Samidih, H. Tabia and Namzich. The magazine in one fort blew up, and the other two forts were damaged. The Sapphire again shelled troops near the Gulf of Adramyti, and destroyed military stations at Tuzburna.

On the same day the Commander-in-Chief of the East Indies, Vice-Admiral Peirse, arrived at Smyrna with battleships and cruisers and bombarded fort Yenickale. Considerable damage was done to the fort, two magazines apparently exploding. The flagship Euryalus shot remarkably accurate.

Bombardment at closer range has now begun, the reduction of Smyrna being a necessary incident in the main operations.

HARCOURT.

GREAT EXCITEMENT IN BERLIN.

LONDON, March 6. The Daily Telegraph says in a message from Copenhagen, that according to telegrams from Berlin, there is great excitement there respecting Greece's attitude. It is generally feared that Greece soon will side with the Allies against Turkey, thus fulfilling her historical duty to take part in the capture of Constantinople. A special to the Daily Express from Amsterdam says that Berlin was much excited to-day over two most serious questions; the first, uneasiness concerned two submarines, which have not reported to the na-

val authorities and are believed to be lost; the second was the news from Athens to the effect that there is a possibility of Greece joining the Allies. On the submarine question the German naval authorities, while refusing to admit the loss, warn the public that one cannot make an omelette without breaking eggs, or smash up the British Empire without losing ships. The attitude of Greece, as depicted in the Wolfe Bureau telegram from Athens, is said to have put the people in a state of rage. It is remembered with considerable bitterness that the Kaiser, two years ago, bestowed a Field Marshal's Baton on King Constantine, accompanying the bestowal by a surprising speech, wherein Germany posed as a natural protector of Greece. On the other hand, the scheme for the Germanization of Greece seems to have failed at Athens as everywhere else.

ADVANCE IN ALSACE.

PARIS, March 7. A French official statement says: On the evening of March 5th we repulsed counter attacks opposite Uthholtz, and blew up an ammunition depot at Cernay. Last night we swept with our fire the enemy's advanced post, who attempted to establish themselves on Sillakerkoff, east of Honnack.

ITALY STILL ON THE FENCE.

ROME, March 7. The resignation of the Greece Prime Minister, Venizelos, caused the wildest excitement in Rome. The belief prevails here that Greece will join the Allies. Local politicians to-day said that Greece's decision was unlikely to influence Italy's position. They prefer to await developments before taking any stand.

FRANCE TAKING PRECAUTIONS.

PARIS, March 7. The Ministry of War announces that on account of the situation in the Dardanelles, in order to meet every eventuality, the Government has decided to concentrate in North Africa an expeditionary force, which will be ready to put to sea at the first sign that it is needed, and be directed to the point where its presence is required.

THE SUBMARINE BLOCKADE.

LONDON, March 7. A despatch from Fushing, says an easier feeling with regard to the German submarine blockade is indicated by the announcement that beginning March 9th the passenger service with England by liners of the Zealand Company, will be considerably extended. At present the British authorities permit only two hundred passengers to leave England daily.

'LA TOURAINE' UNDER CONTROL.

LONDON, March 7. A message from the steamer La Touraine, received at Queenstown, says that the steamer Rotterdam is standing by, prepared to render every assistance, including the transfer of passengers, if necessary. Wireless messages have been sent out to the steamers Arabic, Swanmore and Stanford, saying their assistance is not now required.

CROWN POLICY NOT POPULAR.

WASHINGTON, March 7. The resignation of the Greek cabinet, under Premier Venizelos, was presented to King Constantine yesterday, and accepted. The Greek Legation here was so advised officially to-day. No comment on the announcement was made by the Legation. News despatches have indicated that the resignation was due to the Cabinet's dissent from the Crown's policy of continued neutrality.

MORE THREATS.

PARIS, March 7. A despatch from Athens to the Havas agency, says: "King Constantine has accepted the resignation of Premier Venizelos and his cabinet, and has requested M. Zaimis, Governor of the National Bank, to form a new ministry. M. Zaimis asked the King to give him until to-morrow to massacre would take place in Turkish Minister, Salih Bey, has declared openly during the last few days, that massacres would take place in Turkey if Greece broke out with the Porte, while Count Mirbache, the German Minister, informed the diplomatic corps that Austria and Germany would immediately declare war on Greece the day that Greece moved against Turkey.

WILL LEAVE IN A BODY.

WASHINGTON, March 6. The Foreign Diplomatic Corps in Mexico City, has decided to leave in a body. Despatches, telling of this decision, were received here to-day by European Diplomats and forwarded to their home governments.

CLOSE CENSORSHIP.

LONDON, March 7. The censorship, which had been considerably relaxed of late, was suddenly clamped down again to-day. It is rumored that events of great military and naval importance are taking place. The French official communication and the German statement were held up by the censor to-day, together with despatches from other continental countries.

BOMBARDMENT OF SMYRNA.

PARIS, March 7. An official communication from the Ministry of Marine says that at the Dardanelles during March 6th, three cruisers stationed in the Gulf of Sarcra, bombarded by indirect fire across Gallipoli Peninsula, the Turkish forts at Keldi Babr, which guard the European coast of the narrow strait between that point and Chanak. Results of the bombardment were very satisfactory. The powder magazine

of one of the forts exploded. None of the vessels were damaged. During March 5th three vessels of the Allied fleet bombarded from a great distance the forts at Kasse Kule at the entrance to the Gulf of Smyrna, which was seriously damaged and was unable to make reply.
