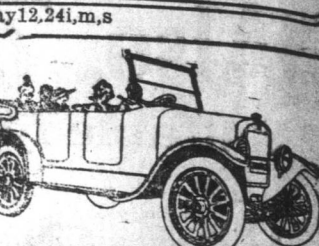

**HARBOR GRACE, To-day.**Large numbers of people came here  
yesterday in expectation of witness-  
ing a trial flight by the Handley-Pago  
machine. The day being beautiful, one  
of the best for the season, almost all  
the population of Carbonear was on  
the scene, in addition to those from  
other neighboring places, and auto-  
mobiles, carriages and bicycles were  
much in evidence. Many folk from  
St. John's were also present, includ-  
ing Mayor and Mrs. Gosling who mo-  
tored around the Bay. Much disap-  
pointment was expressed because no  
fight, as similar opportunity may not  
again offer to see the machine go up.  
The second radiator was attached  
yesterday. Although plane has four  
engines there are but two radiators,  
the arrangement of them, making one  
sufficient to serve two engines, thelatter being placed end to end, two on  
either side of fuselage. Mechanics  
were putting on the dope paint yester-  
day and fixing the smaller parts.Admiral Kerr informs correspond-  
ent that trial may take place this  
afternoon, shortly after four o'clock,  
the regular crew going up. This trial  
will last about an hour, machine  
keeping above aerodrome only and  
not making any lengthy flight. The  
purpose is to test engines, petrol,  
working of rudders and planes.Weather to-day is wonderfully fine.  
As there is a full moon on 13th (Fri-  
day) it is probable that the get-away  
on transatlantic trip will be made.  
Propellers are being put on now in  
readiness for afternoon trial. Wind  
is westerly which is good for trial as  
will permit landing on Eastern slopes  
of drome. The intention to have a  
trial flight to-day is not known in  
Harbor Grace. Before leaving Eng-  
land Admiral Kerr was presented with  
a beautiful silk Union Jack by Prin-  
cess Mary to be flown from plane on

SEARCH FOR THE MISSING.

**LONDON, June 8.**(Via Reuters' Ottawa Agency.)—  
A specially formed unit of the Air  
Force is leaving for headquarters in  
the field, shortly. It will consist of  
twenty officers, who were attached to  
the various army divisions. Their  
purpose is to search for any possi-  
ble traces of missing officers, and  
other ranks of the Royal Air Force  
on the Western Front. This is being  
undertaken to ensure, as far as is  
humanly possible, that no members  
of the force are being detained and  
lying helpless in the hands of the

en route.**WHOLESALE SLAUGHTER.****VIENNA, June 8.**Three thousand peasants, including  
young women and children, have been  
shot or hanged by the Red Army as a  
consequence of the revolt in Western  
Hungary, according to reports re-  
ceived here.**BURNING SHIP TOWED TO PORT.****NEW YORK, June 9.**The story of a desperate battle with  
flames in mid-ocean, in which two  
men lost their lives, was told to-day  
by members of the crew of the British  
sloop Beechleaf, towed into port by  
the transport Westhaven. The Beech-  
leaf, which was bound from Baton  
Rouge to Ireland, took fire off the  
Azores. The engines were put out of  
commission, rudder control disabled,  
and wireless sending equipment de-  
stroyed by, but after working two days  
in heavy seas to get a line to Beech-  
leaf, sent wireless calls for assistance.  
The Westhaven responded and got a  
line aboard. Two of the Beechleaf's  
crew died from burns received in fight-

seriously injured in a runaway acci-  
dent last night: his father, Ernest  
Gurwell, was badly shaken up and  
Mrs. Gurwell and her five-year old  
son had a narrow escape. Mr. Guz-  
well and family had been out driv-  
ing during the evening and when re-  
turning to their home, about 9.30, by  
way of Casey Street, Mr. Gurwell was  
just stepping into his seat when the  
horse became frightened and bolted.  
It dashed along Casey Street to Charl-  
ton Street, and at the junction of  
Charlton and Springdale Streets the  
wagon collided with a hydrant dam-  
aging the latter as well as the vehi-  
cle. Mrs. Gurwell managed to jump  
clear, but the two children held their  
seats and only succeeded in getting  
out of the wagon a few seconds before  
the horse struck an electric pole at  
the corner of John and Springdale Sts.,  
inflicting a deep cut in its side and  
injuring its leg. When the animal  
hit the pole the wagon capsize, throwing the driver to the ground but  
he still held the reins and eventually  
succeeded in bringing the horse to  
a halt. Quite a number of people wit-  
nessed the runaway and the two  
youngsters and Mrs. Gurwell who were  
scattered over the road were hurriedly  
picked up. One of the former and  
the latter only suffering from fright,  
while the third, Harold, was uncon-  
scious and suffering from a deep  
scalp wound. Dr. J. S. Tait was called  
and was quickly on the scene. It  
was necessary to insert several  
stitches in young Gurwell's scalp to  
close the wound. The child's injuries  
however, are not considered danger-
