RESIGN.

LONDON, Oct. 24. Political experts and the editorial itterances in the papers this morning generally express the view that no one expects the Government to resign as a result of the adverse vote in the House yesterday, and that the circumstance of the defeat of the Pilots Am endment in no wise need entail such a step. The incident, however, is regarded on all sides as one which has given the administration a severe shock, a repetition of which it could hardly survive. The vote generally described as an assertion of the independence of the House of Common and a revolt against dictation of Ministers. A determination to reasser the supremacy which the Common surrendered to the Cabinet during the war. More than one hundred supporters of the Coalition, among whom Sir Edward Carson was conspicuous voted against the Government.
