Will Rigidly Enforce Herring Inspection.

Better Packages Must be used by Herring Packers-Inspectors Will See That Quality is Kept Up.

Messrs. E. Coyle and P. Howlett will go to Green Bay this Fall to look after the new pack of herring. The fishermen already have their nets out in several places, and there are indications that the fishery will be a good one. Many packers who lost money in the business the past three or four years, have decided not to venture in this Fall on the usual scale. They will buy conservatively and only at prices that will be sure to allow them a margin of prifit.

There is a strong insistence on the part of the inspectors this season that the packages must be of a better quality than have generally been used in recent years. Inferior herring barrels have done more to ruin the fishery than any other factor and in order to recover the market, the inspectors have been instructed to condemn all barrels, that, in their opinion, are not capable of holding the pickle and keeping the herring good and sound. The fishermen who desire to have this industry kept going have it in their power to do so by offering the herring at reasonable prices, that will enable the exporters to make a fair profit. They also can do much to keep the industry going by packing the herring honestly in good strong barrels that will stand ordinary knocking about without losing their hoops and becoming leaky. We hear that there will be a limited quantity of Scotch Pack put up in Green Bay this Fall but most of the packing will be ordinary, split—Trade a Review. ing have it in their power to do so
