Scots, Wae Hae

(From the Liverpool Courier.)

Sir Robert Bruce makes the lamentable and even startling confession that "There are thousands of young Scots to whom a considerable part of Burns' and even more of some of his predecessors, is utterly unintelligible." This, then, is the result of education: the Scots are forgetting the Scottish.

No longer do they revel in such lines as:
His honest, simple, bawdy face,
Aye gat him friends in like place.

If you ask them the meaning of the words "gat" or "gat" they will reply in correct English, and perhaps even with an Oxford accent, that they have no information on the point. It is useless to sprinkle your conversation, when in Scotland, with such convenient ejaculations as "gat" or "gat" to speak of "a canty day," or call a foolish person a "gat." If you ask for "usquebae" you will go dry. As Hamlet observed, in a moment no less tragic, "That it should come to this."

For these reasons it has seemed needful to 400 delegates from 140 Burns Clubs to pass a resolution in support of the preservation and teaching of the Scottish vernacular. To Englishmen this may seem unnecessary. Scotsmen who wish to acquire a Scottish accent and a knowledge of their native tongue need only come south of the Border.

Aviator Killed as Races Start

ANOTHER FLYER IS SERIOUSLY INJURED.

MITCHEL FIELD, New York, Oct. 8.—One aviator was killed and a second seriously injured in a crash today during the first event of the international air races held here.

Two men, Clarence D. Chamberlain, a pilot, and Lawrence Buranell, a passenger, were in the machine when it crashed several miles away from the judges' stand. First reports stated that both men were dead, but this was later corrected to the announcement that one had been killed and the other was in the hospital. It was officially announced that Chamberlain was the man killed and then changed to state that Buranell had met his death, while Chamberlain was injured.

Chamberlain and Buranell took off with five other machines and were flying 20 laps around a five-mile course marked by three pylons. Mitchell Field, another at Meadowbrook, and the third two miles south of Meadowbrook.

London's Lord Mayor

On September 23rd, the ancient institution of the Court of Aldermen of the City of London elected the Lord Mayor from three names submitted to them. The Lord Mayor's rule extends over the city proper, which occupies an area of a little over a mile, and which is euphemistically styled "the City." To this square mile, however, is attached, north, south, east, and west that Greater London which spreads itself over no mean portion of Middlesex, having a population of nearly 5,000,000 people. London had its name only in the year 85 B.C. However, jumping a few hundred years, we find that London received its first charter from William the Conqueror in 1066. It being some 1600 years later that the title of Mayor was bestowed upon the chief commoner. The title was standardized to that of Lord Mayor in 1545, and has so remained until today.
