**Ontario Veterinary College.**  
In our report of the proceedings of the Council of the Ontario Agricultural and Arts Association, held at Toronto on Thursday last, our readers would not fail to have noticed that through the efforts of the Hon. David Christie, a resolution was carried for the transfer of the Ontario Veterinary College to the Provincial Farm at Guelph, where in future it will be conducted in connection with the School of Agriculture there. The resolution was carried without much opposition, ten voting for, and four against it. The sum of \$4000 was also appropriated for the erection of a suitable building for the College, on a suitable site which will be granted by the Government on the Farm.  
Our readers will be gratified to learn that the resolution of the Council is to be acted on at once. Mr. Christie came to Guelph on Monday to select a site, have it surveyed, and to make other preparations for the erection of the College without delay, so that it may be ready for occupation by the time the usual session of the College commences. We believe that an excellent site has been chosen, commanding a good view of the town, convenient to the Farm buildings, and in every way suitable for the purpose.  
The transfer of this College to the Farm, and its connection with the School of Agriculture there, will be of the greatest advantage to the students of that Institution, as well as to those who simply attend the lectures on Veterinary Science. In addition to the knowledge they will gather in practical and experimental farming, the former class of students also will have the opportunity of attending the Veterinary lectures without charge, and will thereby gain much valuable information in reference to the diseases of animals and their proper treatment, which will be of immense benefit to them when they go into practical farming for themselves. To the students who attend the College for the purpose of taking their diplomas and practicing the Veterinary Art, the transfer will be equally advantageous. Hitherto, in Toronto, they have had scarcely an opportunity of observing the diseases of any other animals but horses, but here on the Farm, where all kinds of stock are kept, and being too in the heart of such a fine agricultural district, the diseases of all such will come under their observation. Their knowledge will thereby be greatly enlarged, and they cannot fail to become, in consequence, more skillful and better practitioners.  
The arrangements regarding the Professors, &c., are not yet matured, but it is hoped that Mr. Smith, the present able head of the Veterinary College, will still continue his connection with it. We suppose the lectures on materia medica, chemistry, and other subjects, will be supplied by the teachers in the Agricultural School, or by local professional men. The College, as it is now, will be under the control of the Agricultural Association, in whom the Government has vested the power of granting diplomas. The cost of maintaining it here will not be any more than it is at present in Toronto, while the advantages of having it connected with the Provincial Farm are so many and so apparent that no one will for a moment question the wisdom of the Council in making the change. Guelph will also profit largely by the transfer, for the people in town will reap the benefit of board- ing for 60 or more students who will attend the college every winter, and who will not be lodged or boarded at the Farm.  
THE VOTERS' LIST.—We notice that several of the Township Councils in the Centre and North Ridings of this County have been busy engaged in the work of revising the voters' lists. In West Garafraxa and Peel especially more than usual interest was taken by those on both sides of politics. Regularly appointed agents were sent to the meetings of Council and the qualification of each voter were closely scrutinized. This is as it should be. Let those interested on both sides of politics exercise all vigilance in order to secure a correct voters' list, and then we shall have no trouble at elections about bad or doubtful votes.
