Sub-committees of the Council, the City Planning Commission and the Parks Board, Look for Available **Around City**

Late yesterday afternoon the first of the four sub-committees representing the council, the city planning commission and the parks board got out on the trail n search of suitable sites for play grounds and parks. In the party were Commissioner Graves, Alderman Ramsay, G. M. Lang, Lawrence, M. Gotch, and Secretary Lemon of the city planning commis-

The plateau overlooking the exhibtition grounds, from which a splendid view of the heart of Calgary is obtained was the stopping place. The boys of East Calgary have been playing football and baseball up there, and Com-missioner Graves suggested that the city should have at least a block of the land in what is known as the Ramsay estate. The committee also observed the tract of land overlooking the Elbow, between Sixth street and the Ramsay property which, it has been suggested, the city should obtain because of the fine view which private owners will, some day, shut
