RUSSIA FIGHTS AGAINST GOD

The Soviet government continues, as its own spokesman once put it, to especial ruthlessness, were tolerated "wage war on the Divine front." It by the Soviets. Yet, it is contended, the militant materialism of the Communist party ruling in Russia continues to weigh heavily on the life of Russian believers. Thus we are told further, because of the interference of the Government, the main branch of the Greek Catholic Church, "Tikhonite" Church, still remains without a spiritual leader. Patriarch Tikhon died in the spring of this year, and a successor was to have been elected within three months of the date of his death. But as Metropolitan Peter, the Keeper of the Patriarchal Throne said to have let it be known, the Soviets would not allow a conclave to gather for the election. At the same time, we are told, the government continues to patronize, though unof ficially, the "New," or as it is also called, "Red" Church—the Living Church the Resurrection Church-Bolshevist hands is a tool with which to belabor the Tikhonite Church. The "Red" churches recently held their conclaves at Moscow, and decided to support the anti-religious Soviet Gov-ernment. The official Communist Izviestia of Moscow tells us what oc curred at one of these conclaves:

"Bishop Antonin (the chairman) displayed an unusual tenderness for the Communists. He said: "During a recent public discussion on materialism and spiritualism, Lunacharsky (a leading Communist) declared that no prayer has ever been heard. This is not true, for our prayers for the Soviet Power will be heard by the refuges Cyrill and Nicholas Romanoff and by the anti-Bolshevist Bishops They will hear them and burst with anger. In our temples the Soviets must feel at home. We must say to the Soviet Government: "I love thee."
"The conclave has adopted a reso-

lution in keeping with which the Reintroduce in its masses a prayer for the Soviet regime, worded as follows: 'Lord, grant victory to our Govern-ment over its enemies for the welfare of the people."

According to Vazrozhdenie, the nationalist anti-Bolshevist daily pub-lished in Paris by an influential group of Russian emigres, including the fol-lowers of the Grand Duke Nicholas Nicholayevich, it is exactly this subservient tone adopted by the new churches toward the Soviet Government that deprives them of all authority in the eyes of the Russian believ ers. Every one, says this paper knows that these churches are a sor of department of the Soviet machin It is for this reason, that the new churches control but a few parishes in Moscow and still fewer in the provinces, while the Tikhonite Church commands the sympathies of the bulk of Russia in spite of the persecutions befalling it. The paper adds:

"Metropolitan Peter, the Keeper of the Patriarchal Throne, has been threatened on many occasions. But accepting his lofty post, he was aware of the danger. He knows to what measures the Government and its political police may resort, and yet he has dden his clergymen to communicate with the Living Church and to participate in its conclave. This is also known to the fifty-eight bishops who have sided with him as well as to the crowds filling his temples and keeping away from the empty temple of Soviet officials imitating priests.'

The Tikhonite Church is still very Persecutions have added to strong. its moral forces instead of weaken-The anti-Bolshevist liberal Rule, published in Berlin, thinks that the Soviets have abandoned hope of annihilating the church by direct interference, and that they are now re anti-religious lying mainly on the ropaganda among children whom they want to bring up in the spirit of olete atheism. It says:

"On the eve of every Church holiday anti-religious lectures or shows are organized in Soviet schools. Be sides and then an anti-religious show is staged for all schools of each edueational district. Members of the Union of Communists Youths, as well as "Red Pioneers," are obliged to attend such shows. The other children are advised not to miss them.

These shows are usually very prim itive and rude. 'Artists' put on enormous blue noses and thick stomachs and, clad in real ecclesiastic vestments requestioned from churches, move round with crosses in their hands. If the show is staged for several schools once, the program is enlarged, and children are shown, in addition to the Greek Catholic priest, a rabbi, a mollah, and a Roman Catholic prelate. SYNOPSIS OF . LAND ACT AMENDMENTS

PRE-EMPTIONS

Vacant, unreserved, surveyed crown lands may be pre-empted by Brittish subjects over 18 years of age, and by allens en declaring intenties 19 become British subjects, conditional upon residence, occupation, and improvement for agricultural surpasses.

Full information concerning regu-tions regarding pre-emptions is given in Bulletin Ne. 1, Land Series, tiow to Fre-empt Land," copies of which can be obtained free of charge by addressing the Department of ands, Viotoria, B.C., or to any dev-rement Agent.

Records will be granted covering my land suitable for agricultural purposes, and which is not timberand, i.e., carrying over 5,000 board feet per acre west of the Coast Range and 8,000 feet per acre east of that

Applications for pre-emptions are obe addressed to the Land Comnissioner of the Land Recording Dission, in which the land applied for is situated, and are made on printed forms, copies of which can be element from the Land Commissioner
